Mr. W. T. Curtis was called to the south last week owing to the sad news of the death of his sister at Tilsonburg, Ontario.

Notice has been given of the intention to appoint a permanent liquidator and wind up the affairs of the New Porcupine Imperial Mines Co.

Mr. D. R. Lloyd, of Schumacher, recently resigned as a member of the Tisdale Township Council, and the resignation was accepted, as Mr. Lloyd was leaving for the Old Country.
