MYSTERIOUS SILVER FIND TURNS OUT OF NO ACCOUNT.

Some weeks ago there was an old-time mysterious rush of prospectors from Haileybury and Cobalt to some unknown new field "somewhere." The prospectors flitted out quietly, and would give no information as to where they were headed for. Ever since there has been a silver camp in the North there have been these mysterious new wonderful finds that the wise ones refused to get excited about as they almost always turned out to be of no particular interest. Last week the latest rush to the "mystery field" ceased as suddenly as it had begun. Prospectors returned with the information that they had been misled. They had travelled out in the Township of Rattray about 20 miles from the railway and near the Quebec boundary where men were supposed to be working on a vein of practically solid silver. Instead of this, however, they found a number of men in one of the lumber camps working on a bed of bismuth of no commercial value. It may be recalled that last Spring there was another small "mystery rush" on, and in this one several Porcupine prospectors were more or less interested. Investigation of the alleged wonderful find disclosed the fact that there was nothing to write home about. It is an odd fact that the silver camp has quite a few of these mystery rushes that never amount to anything. In the gold camps, on the other hand, there is usually more gold than mystery in the discoveries reported.

REGISTRATION FEE ON LETTERS NOW TO BE 10c.

According to one of those delightful "news items" sent out from the Post Office Department at Ottawa last week, "an amendment to the Post Office Act passed during the recent session of Parliament fixes the Registration Fee on letters and other matter mailed in Canada at 10 cents (10c) per each letter or article. The above fee shall apply to all registered mail matter posted in Canada on and after July 15th 1920. The public are advised in order that they may see that all registered matter is fully prepaid as regards both postage and registration fee."

The present fee for registration of mail matter is 5c. The new rate now about to go into effect is thus double the rate that has prevailed for so many years. Ten cents now for registration fee in Canada. Everything is advancing.

HIGHWAY COMMITTEE NOW BUSY ON DETAILS OF PLAN

Chairman of Associated Boards of Trade Committee Gathering Local Information.

Unlike many committees appointed under similar circumstances, the Committee appointed at the recent meeting of the Associated Boards of Trade of Temiskaming to advance the proposal regarding a highway through the North Land to North Bay at once got busy on the work and is now actively engaged in gathering details regarding the highway as it will affect the various localities of the North Land. Last week Chairman Geo. A. Smith of this Committee sent out the following letter to the various members appointed to the "Highways Committee." The letter speaks for itself, and is in substance as follows:—

"At a regular meeting of the Temiskaming Associated Boards of Trade held at Iroquois Falls on June 28, 1920, you were appointed as one of the Committee to consider and advise details in regard to building a macadam highway from Cochrane, Timmins and Iroquois Falls connecting with southern points to North Bay.

"At present I would ask you to secure what information you possibly can on the following points:—Where the highway should be built in your section of the country; the existing roads and rights-of-way that have been cut; supplies of rock and gravel and distance from your proposed plan of such highway.

"The following I would be pleased to have information as soon as possible:—The general feeling of your district as to the highway. Also what advantages you think such would be to your town or district.

"The above will greatly assist the writer in getting all details into shape, when you will receive a copy of the full plans on construction, financing and reforestation to present to your local Board of Trade for your consideration and approval.
