by-law so that the matter may be gone on with at once.

The account of Sutcliffe & Neelands for work in connection with the water works extensions and sewerage engineering had been adjusted at \$1850, and a cheque for this amount was authorized to be sent the firm. The firm were quite ready to do anything necessary in connection with the work up to the time it was taken over by the Town, and to accept any responsibility for it up to that time.

"What about the incinerator?" asked Councillor Laprairie. The Mayor replied that the representative of the company had been here and all was ready to go ahead if the company would take over the town debentures for the cost in the matter. If they would not buy the debentures, the matter would have to drop so far as the town was concerned. Tisdale was paying cash for its share, by means of debentures the Township was selling, so the company felt it could finance the matter all right.

Another lengthy discussion arose over the matter of the disposal plant. The Mayor thought the disposal plant should be proceeded with at once. Without the disposal plant the sewerage system was useless. If the matter was not gone on with this year, it would mean practically another year before the sewerage system could be used. Even if the plant could not be completed this year, a big start could be made, and several months gained, that would mean that the system could be in use next summer. While recognizing the force of the Mayor's arguments, Councillor Longmore questioned the business wisdom of attempting to go on with the work this year

under the circumstances. He would not like to see anything that would strain the credit of the town nor would he wish to see the town debentures sold on the present low market. The Mayor thought that the bank should see its way clear to financing this necessary work, and there was practical agreement that if the bank did so it would be all right to go ahead.

Councillor Laprairie brought up the question of the water main asked for by Moneta for fire protection only. The main would have a value for the town and it would be all installed by the Township. The Clerk was instructed to write the Fire Underwriters for their standing on the question and if the insurance people do not object, the Town will give the necessary permission. Moneta people plan to put in about 2000 feet of main with hydrants for water protection only. There will be a shut-off at the Town boundary to be used in case of need.

Instructions were given for the preparing of a by-law appointing Constable Greer an officer for the enforcement of the O.T.A.

Chief Wilson reported that he had been receiving many complaints regarding the scavenger service. He understood that while the scavenger was busy hauling logs, the scavenger service had been neglected, collections not being made for several weeks in some cases that he had investigated. Chairman of the Contingencies Committee was asked to look into the question.

A by-law was ordered prepared to appoint a pound-keeper.

On motion of Councillors Longmore and Fogg a resolution was passed earnestly requesting the continuance of the work for forest fire protection around the town. Appreciation was expressed for the good work done this year on this regard, but this was only about one third of what was necessary and the hope was expressed that the rest of the very necessary work would be carried out at once. If this were done the town would be practically safe from the bush fire menace.

In the discussion of this fire protection matter reference was made to the current story that those in charge of the clearing were burning everything, even good firewood, and would not either sell it or give it away to those going after it. The Mayor said he had heard the story, but it was incorrect. Good wood would be sold to anyone going after it the price being nominal. Of course the idea of clearing had to take precedence, but it was well for all to understand that those in charge were fair and reasonable in every way and were not carrying red tape to any foolish extreme. The work of clearing was being done in first-class way and those in charge of the work deserved every credit. The Chief Fire Ranger, Mr. Woodcock, was working for the protection of the district from the bush menace, but would be very ready to accommodate the public in any way that did not interfere with the work.

The Mayor referred to the fact that Haileybury, Cobalt and other towns were receiving a share of the guns being distributed by the Government as war trophies. In view of the creditable part taken by the people of Timmins in the war he thought this town should not be forgotten when the captured guns were being passed around. He was writing the Member for Temiskaming regarding the matter.

The usual passing of current accounts, salaries, etc., and other routine business was dealt with before the Council adjourned to the call of the Mayor.

**IROQUOIS FALLS MAYOR  
HAS BEEN LOCATED.**

According to the despatches in the daily newspapers Mayor S. G. McCoubrey of Iroquois Falls, who disappeared a couple of months ago while on a visit to Montreal, has been located and thus anxiety for his safety is removed. He is an old sailor and it is understood that while at Montreal he came under the call of his old profession and following the impulse of the moment shipped as a sailor on a vessel bound for overseas. He visited Ireland and from there communicated with his family and friends and then started back to this side of the sea, working his passage on his old calling, it is understood. On return to Montreal he again communicated with relatives and friends at Iroquois Falls, asking among other things for the sending on of some of his clothes and effects. In response to this, according to the despatches from Montreal, the Town Clerk at the Falls left with a trunkful of clothes for Montreal with the expectation of inducing the missing Mayor to return to Iroquois Falls and once more take up the every day life of useful living in the New North.

**PORQUIS JUNCTION HOLDS  
MEETING RE HIGHWAY.**

Last night a meeting of the citizens of Porquis Junction and district was called to go on record as in hearty support and sympathy with the proposal of Mr. Geo. A. Smith regarding the building of a highway from Timmins, Cochrane and Iroquois Falls through the North Land to North Bay to connect up the towns of the North and link them with the south. Mr. Smith's plan for financing the proposal through the use of the North Land's timber resources appealed to the people at the Junction as a very acceptable idea.

The fact is that the new Highway proposal is meeting with very general and enthusiastic support from all the communities of the North Land.

Mrs. Alexina Giroux, wife of Mr. Arthur Giroux, died on July 9th, after an illness of some three months from pernicious anaemia. The deceased was born at Buckingham, Que., about thirty years ago and was very highly esteemed by all who knew her here. Sincere sympathy is extended to the husband in his sad loss. The remains were taken to Ritter, Ontario, for interment.

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
