SIMILARITY OF NAMES CAUSED ERROR IN REPORT.

In the paragraph last week referring to the many here called upon to face infractions of the Ontario Temperance Act, the name of "Frank Byek" appeared. Death was due to indigestion, the little girl, who was only 6 months and 15 days old at the time of death, having suffered practically from birth with this trouble. RESIDENTIAL ACADEMY PROPOSED AT MONTEITH

Assistant Chief Inspector Outlines Plan for Entrance Pupils and Those More Advanced.

For some years past the matter of the higher education has been a problem and a puzzle to parents in this part of the North Land. The establishment of the Continuation Classes at Timmins helped materially in the solution of the problem for those in the town or immediate vicinity. Still further needed educational facilities for pupils with Entrance or more advanced standing are suggested in a letter recently sent out by Dr. J. B. MacDougall, Assistant Chief Inspector, to secretaries of School Boards and others in this part of the North Land. The letter is as follows, and explains itself:—

"It is the intention to open Monteith Northern Academy as a residential school for boys and girls in the fall term of the present year. It is designed thereby, to furnish to all pupils of Entrance and higher standing an opportunity to attain a complete and thorough education under conditions as favourable as possible. This is a splendid building excellently heated, provided with electric lighting, full kitchen and dormitory equipment and the best sanitary conveniences.

The pupils will be in residence under careful and kindly oversight. The effort will be made to reproduce as largely as possible the conditions and comforts of a well-managed home. Pupils may return to their homes daily or at the week-end as train connections and other conditions permit. Only skilled teachers will be employed and the school will be as fully equipped as possible looking to both physical comfort and educational progress.

It is expected that for the present only those who have attained High School Entrance standing will be admitted. The course will cover not less than two years but it is desired that the full course of three or four years will be aimed at in order to qualify for teaching or any other accredited profession.

No fees will be charged for tuition. Board and lodging will be not more than it will cost to maintain the pupils at home.

All pupils are entitled to attend from rural and town or village schools. It is especially desired to serve the rural community, and all the rural activities of the Demonstration Farm will be at the service of the school. Extensive gardens will be attached to the school for practical work on the part of the students and spacious athletic grounds will also be provided.

We would ask you, therefore, to give us the names and P. O. addresses of pupils who will attend from your school:—

- (1) those who are trying Entrance this Summer or have already passed, and
- (2) to guide us in future plans those who will be preparing for Entrance during the coming year and who might attend immediately were classes for Entrance opened.

(Note—This last provision (2) applies only to rural schools).

We trust that everyone possible will take advantage of this unique opportunity and parents and teachers lend the undertaking their hearty co-operation and support.

SOCIETY TAKES PART IN 'THE GLORIOUS LADY'
