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MEMBERS OF PROVINCIAL HOUSE MAY VISIT HERE.

Early this summer the proposal was made that the whole Ontario Legislature should visit the North Land so that the members might have an intelligent understanding of this country, its problems and its needs, and thus the long neglect and misunderstanding of the North Land might in some measure be avoided. The proposal in the first place was made by the Iroquois Falls and District Board of Trade who sent an urgent invitation to Premier Drury and his parliament to spend some time in the North Land as soon as the session of the House was concluded. The Iroquois Falls and District Board of Trade thought that as soon as the session was concluded all the members could come up here and see things for themselves. Toronto newspapers now rather naively suggest that it was impossible to take the trip because "sufficient sleeping car accommodation could not be secured." Perhaps, another reason was that the farmers all wanted to get home as soon as the session was over so that they might see to the fall ploughing or the spring ploughing, whichever is done in the spring of the year. Spring wheat, or fall wheat, spring or fall ploughing, or whatever the cause the Legislators did not come North this spring or summer, but they may come next month. When Hon. Beniah Bowman was in Cochrane a week or so ago he was questioned on the matter and is understood as much in favour of the Legislature in a body visiting the North Land. Further, according to the despatches, Hon. Beniah thought that such a visit was not only possible, but probable. He was apparently willing to see that it was arranged. The visit will likely be in September. The programme will include an inspection of the North Land from Temagami as far north as Cochrane and as far west as Hearst. All the principal towns and centres will be visited and attention paid not only to the leading industries and the possibilities and resources of the various districts, but also thought and consideration given to the problems and the needs of the country generally.

TWO MEN MURDERED AT TEMISKAMING, QUE.

The finding of the coroner's jury holding inquest into the death of A. Kustman and T. Kolodriky whose dead bodies were found last week at Temiskaming, Que. would suggest that the two men were murdered a short distance from the pulp and paper plant of the Riorden Company. Kustman was last seen by his brother in company with two strangers whose names he did not know. The bodies of the two men were discovered by Fire Ranger Hemmingly. The two bodies were covered with bruises and punctures which seemed to have been caused by a spike or a long nail. A bullet had also apparently been fired through Kolodriky's neck from behind. It is supposed that a quarrel arose over some dispute over cards, it being understood that the two dead men had been playing cards with the two strangers who since have disappeared. Search is being made to secure the two "strangers," and in the meantime the police also are keeping tabs on several in this district who are suspected of knowing more than appears about the tragedy.

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
