**ANOTHER PHASE OF THE
NORTH LAND SEPARATION.**

From time to time there appear decided indications of the desire of certain parts of Ontario's North Land for separation from the older part of the Province. Usually these indications of a deep current of feeling are scoffed at by the wisegars of Old Ontario. "Just advertising stunts!" say the supposedly clever folk of the older part of the Province. The news papers of Old Ontario always are able to sweep aside the suggestions of the separation of the North Land from the rest of the Province. The suggestions, however, recur from time to time, and each time there seems to be an added strength to the demands. It is much to be regretted that the newspapers and the people of the older parts of the Province do not look below the surface and seek an understanding of the conditions that give rise to these recurring demands for a new province or a readjustment of the present provinces. The truth is that the calls for a separation of the North Land from the rest of Ontario arise from well-defined causes that are not beyond remedy. In a word, the trouble is that the North Land constantly feels that it is treated generally with a lack of intelligent knowledge and understanding that provoke well-justified anger and annoyance. The needs of the North and the problems of the North receive too little consideration. A country can be used as a milch cow to such an extent that it feels, (to use a sadly mixed metaphor), that it is being made the goat. That is the feeling of the North Land. Last year there was a very noticeable agitation started in this part of the North Land looking for either more intelligent consideration from Old Ontario, or for the opportunity to form a new and separate province. This month the agitation has broken out in a new place and in a new way. Mr. Peter Heeman, M. P. P. for Keora, Ontario, is forward with the suggestion that northwestern Ontario should be taken from the present province and added to Manitoba. Mr. Heeman points out that such a move would be for the convenience and advantage of those at present living in northwestern Ontario. He seems to believe that as a part of Manitoba the northwestern district would receive a larger measure of the

attention and consideration that it merits. Will the Ontario Government simply say, "Oh, just an advertising stunt?" Or will the authorities have understanding and thought enough to realize that there is something more than just "advertising" or "common cussedness" beneath the repeated demands for a fair, square deal for the North Land of Ontario? To "pooh, pooh!" the question is not to answer it. Unless the Government wishes the separation spirit to grow and expand something will have to be done to show that the authorities have a knowledge of the North Land and its needs and an honest desire and intention to right any wrongs and give the pioneers of the far north a fair, square deal.

**ANOTHER INCIDENT IN
NORTHLAND ROAD PROBLEM**

Another sidelight on the road situation in the north land is the volunteering of fifteen miners and prospectors interested in the Skead Township gold area to help in the widening of the road from Boston Creek to the centre of activity in Skead. Of course such an offer is very pleasing, indicating as it undoubtedly does the public spirit of the miners and prospectors, and their genuine faith in the district. Also the Government should take advantage of the generous offer to get so much more work done on the roads of the north. But the incident should bear a deeper significance and lesson for the Government. The Government should catch some of the faith and enthusiasm of the pioneers of the north. The Government is actually disgraced by leaving so heavy a share of the burden of development upon the men who are already doing so much and taking such unusual risks. The whole road problem of the North Land has been badly handled from the very beginning. It may be true that the Governments have spent large sums of money on colonization roads, but much of the money so expended has not been well used. For instance, in many parts of the North Land there are roadways that were cleared at considerable cost, yet to-day are all grown over again, because there was no genuine call for their construction in the first place. On the other hand innumerable sections are in serious need of roads that should be built, but have been delayed on account of the cost. The Government should see to the construction of roads where they are actually needed and warranted. This work should not be left as an added burden on those who are valiantly struggling to open up and develop this new country. The North Land has immense resources of forest and mine and at least a part of the revenue from these resources should be spent by the Government in making easier the burden on those who pioneer the new places.

**HEAVY OVERBURDEN ADDS
DIFFICULTY TO DRILL WORK.**

The American Porcupine Gold Mining Company have been doing diamond drill work under some difficulties, according to all reports. Their property is in Mountjoy Township and there is a considerable "overburden" on the property. This makes the work of diamond drilling a less easy matter than it would be in ordinary mining land. The owners of the property, however, believe they have the goods beneath the overburden and in view of the experience of practically all of the mines of the Porcupine,—that the deeper you go the better it gets,—probably they are right. At any event the American Porcupine Gold Mining Co., is proceeding to explore their property and are not sparing time or trouble to test out its possibilities.
