FIRE WITHOUT PERMIT

NEW VEIN GUT ON KEORA 8 FEET WIDE AT 140 FEET

Keora Issues Report Reviewing Progress During Past Six Months.

Last week the Porcupine Keora issued a report covering the operations for the past six months. The report, which is signed by Wm. B. Gunton, the secretary, speaks for itself, and is in part as follows:-

"The development plan called for a shaft 250 feet and a crosscut 363 feet to the north, to cut the high grade ore located by diamond drilling in veins numbers five and six.

"This shaft is now completed, equipped and timbered to a depth of 150 feet, which a little more than passes the halfway mark in sinking.

"At a depth of about 140 feet and at the date of this writing, a highly mineralized vein showing a width of eight feet and dipping to the north, passed through the shaft. This discovery, the company's manager desthe full importance of it will not be determined until the same vein is cut again in the crosscut. Without time at this writing to explore this discoverey, the company's manager describes it as fine looking ore which may become of considerable importance, although it must be remembered that this is not included in our development expectations as outlined in our report of December last.

"As the shareholders may not have before them the results of diamond drilling previously reported, we are re stating them herewith as follows:

Vein No. 1.—Traced for over 600 feet on the surface showed a width of 40 feet and an average value in gold of \$6.00 per ton. This vein was cut with two deep drill holes 100 feet apart at a depth of 748 feet, showing values of \$6.26 and \$5.95.

Vein No. 2.—Shows a width of 18 inches and an average value of \$11.80 per ton.

Vein No. 3.—Shows a width of 24 inches and an average value of \$3.40 per ton.

Vein No. 4.—Shows a width of 15 inches and an average value of \$19.40 per ton.

Vein No. 5.—Shows a width 20 feet and an average value of \$110 in gold

Vein No. 6.—Shows a width of 10 feet and an average value of \$47.50 in gold per ton.
