**PROSPECTING FOR GOLD IN TOWNSHIP OF BRYCE.**

It is understood that several prospectors from the Elk Lake and Gowanda areas have gone into the Bryce Township district to stake gold claims. A deposit recently opened up in Bryce Township is said to have shown excellent assays. Mr. Burrows, Government geologist, has just returned from paying a visit to the area, and, while his official report on Bryce Township is not yet available, prospectors who have gone into Bryce are quite enthusiastic over the prospects. One old timer who went in there, however, says that there is nothing to get wildly excited about. He says there is high-grade ore in evidence with the chances very good for quantities of the high-grade stuff. "But the Porcupine is loaded with even better stuff, and no one is making any desperate howl about it," he says. His idea is that while it is all right to keep on prospecting new fields, it is just as necessary not to neglect the older fields. Just as the scattering of early settlement makes pioneering more costly and inconvenient, so the "scattering" of effort on gold fields has a somewhat similar effect.

**OUTLOOK FOR HOCKEY IN HAILEYBURY GOOD NOW.**

According to The Haileyburian the outlook for good hockey this coming winter is very bright. Chances for a good line-up are favourable, but for the most part the team will be composed of new men, with the probable exception of Bill Speck and Ken Carmichael. All hopes of having Archie Briden have been given up as he is returning to the West. Efforts are being made to procure Lockington and Art Jones who played last year with the Monarchs in Winnipeg. Bill Brydge, of Iroquois Falls, and Brackenberry, of North Bay, are also being sought by Haileybury, the latter apparently thinking they can secure these two players. McNamara, an old-time coach of the Canadiens, intends spending the winter in Haileybury, and they are planning to put him in charge of the team as manager and coach. At a meeting last week Haileybury organized for the season, the following being the officers elected:—President, H. L. Slagut; vice-presidents, W. A. Gordon and I. A. Solomon; secretary-treasurer, I. J. Dunan. Six honorary vice-presidents were elected,—Messrs R. T. Shillington, N. J. McAulay, N. Ferland, D. L. Jemmett, Clemens and Hennessy.
