**APPEALS RE ASSESSMENT OF PORCUPINE MINES.**

Appeal is being heard this week at Osgoode Hall, Toronto, in connection with the assessment of certain Porcupine mines. Practically all the mines of consequence in this district are concerned in the appeal, with the exception of the Hollinger. The Hollinger is in the Town of Timmins and has made no appeal from the assessment as revised by the Court of Revision of the Town of Timmins. The other mines being in the Township of Tisdale were concerned in the assessment plan proposed by Mr. C. B. Morgan when he was Reeve of Tisdale and by others in that Township. This plan materially increased the municipal assessment of all mines in the Township. Appeal was made to the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board, and now appeal is being made to Osgoode Hall from the order of the Municipal Board in the matter. The appeal is listed at Osgoode Hall as follows:—Re McIntyre Porcupine Mines and Morgan; re Dome Mines and Morgan; re Dome Lake Mining and Milling Co. and Morgan; re Davidson Gold Mines and Morgan; re Schumacher Gold Mines and Morgan; M. G. Young, K.C., for Chas. B. Morgan and Chas. V. Gallagher; J. K. Murdoch for Schumacher Gold Mines, and R. S. Robertson for all the other mining companies. Appeals by Chas. B. Morgan and Chas. V. Gallagher, from order of Ontario Railway and Municipal Board of 25th May 1920, setting aside assessment of the mining companies by the Township of Tisdale, and declaring that the mines were not assessable. Appeals partly argued, but not concluded.

**THE DEMAND FOR MINING SHARES ON THE INCREASE.**

The market keeps steady on the Standard Mining Exchange with growing demand for good mining shares. There are, of course, the usual fluctuations, where some gilt-edged issues, for example may show a move downward for other than reasons of merit. But in general the stock market suggests a growing and steady demand for mining shares, with the chances very strong that this demand will increase in the near future until it will assume proportions that will constitute a steady and permanent boom, particularly in the gold stocks. The High Cost of Living has apparently reached its peak. Price changes now are likely to be downward. Every reduction in costs means so much improved prospects for the gold mines. The gold industry has passed its most trying time and weathered the storm well. Decreased costs in the gold industry now means opportunity for profits. If prices go down, it will mean that the gold has so much more purchasing power. Gold being the standard and so remaining at a fixed value practically increases in value when other commodities decline. There is a general realization of the fact that the coming days are going to be unusually prosperous ones for the gold industry. The Porcupine Camp is going to be one of the best places for men and their money in the immediate future.

Hamilton B. Wills & Co. have arranged for a "one-minute service" over the wire to their office here so that all the baseball fans can keep posted to the second in the World's Series games.

Arthur Colley, the pilot who brought the aeroplane to Timmins for Labour Day week, left New Liskeard on Monday for a non-stop flight to Toronto. Pilot Colley was in the North Land for about six weeks with his aeroplane. He spent several weeks in New Liskeard as well as visiting Timmins, Ville Marie and other places to give demonstrations of flying, etc. He started a couple of weeks ago to leave for Toronto, but misjudged the landing place at Liskeard Beach on account of the reflection on the water. He and Dare-Devil Landrigan landed with the machine in the water and were rescued with difficulty. The aeroplane was damaged to quite an extent and the necessary repairs and new parts made the trip impossible until this week.

**EVENING CLASSES HERE COMMENCE OCTOBER 19**

Opportunity Given All For Technical And Industrial Education.

The Technical and Industrial Classes held here early this year under the auspices of the Public School Board in conjunction with the Ontario Board of Education proved very successful and generally helpful. The success and helpfulness of the new series opening in the Timmins Public School on October 19th should be even more marked. English for non-English speaking and coming Canadians.  
Book-keeping.  
Machine Design and Sketching.  
Mathematics and Arithmetic.  
Courses for Metal Miners and Mill Workers.  
Sewing Classes.

In addition, classes will be opened in other subjects, (such as Electricity, for example), if a sufficient number offer for enrollment in such subjects. The cost of the courses is merely nominal. They offer unusual opportunity for betterment, improvement and advancement. No man or woman, young or old, should miss the opportunity thus afforded.
