

ANOTHER NAVY LEAGUE CONCERT SUNDAY EV'G

Two Motion Pictures Will Be Shown
As Well as Fine Musical
Programme Given.

The campaign for the Town of Timmins for the Navy League of Canada has not yet been concluded. The objective of the Town in this campaign was set at \$500.00, and up to date this amount has not been secured. From the Tag Day held here recently about \$150.00 was netted, and there was also a collection secured from the Sunday evening meeting in the theatre preliminary to the opening of the campaign. As the funds from this campaign are to go to providing for the sailors and their dependents and to assist in awakening nation-wide interest in naval matters, Timmins naturally does not wish to "fall down" in the campaign. Accordingly, there will be another meeting in the theatre on Sunday evening. The Mayor will preside. The programme will be in keeping with the day and the event. There will be selections by the Timmins Citizens' Band and other high-class music, vocal and instrumental, by gifted local talent. In addition two motion picture films will be shown. One of these will be the views of the Hollinger and other mines of the district, showing the gold industry from beginning to end. This picture has only been shown publicly here on one other occasion, and all who have not seen it should make a point of being present. Indeed, it is the kind of 1200 picture that will be well worth viewing a second time.

People of the town and district should make a special note of the Navy League concert Sunday evening after the church services.

REPORTED FIND OF ZINC IN PORCUPINE DISTRICT.

LATCHFORD ONCE MORE A REGULAR MUNICIPALITY.

Latchford has had an experience not equalled by any other town in Ontario so far as known. Once a thriving place with a magnificent hotel, fine houses and stores, etc., it lost prestige and trade until eventually on default in the payment of its bonded indebtedness the town was pinched by the law,—seized for debt. The hotel was taken down and shipped to the south for re-building, the hotel furniture was sold to Cobalt people, the houses and stores were torn down and shipped south. The Town Council ceased to exist and even the school eventually was closed. But Latchford has come back on the map. Mr. Hugh McNeill has been elected Mayor of Latchford; the school has been re-opened; and the necessary school trustees and other officials duly selected. Latchford is a regular town again and has made arrangements to eventually provide for the carrying on of town affairs and the meeting of its bonded indebtedness.

TEACHERS FOR THE NEW ACADEMY AT MONTEITH.

Mr. and Mrs. G. S. Johnson, of Whitby, Ont., have come to the North Land to take charge of the teaching of the Northern Academy at Monteith the new school for higher education being opened by the Ontario Government to afford educational facilities of public, high and normal school grades for the young people of this part of the North Land. Mr. Johnson, who has been principal of the high school at Whitby for the past

five years, will be the principal of the new Northern Academy, and Mrs. Johnson will be lady principal and teacher of Moderns and English. Mr. Johnson will teach agriculture as a specialty. During his term at Whitby Mr. Johnson developed the high school there to a high standard of excellence and it is believed that he will make the Monteith School a power in the North Land. Mr. Johnson has been for some years principal of the summer school in agriculture at Whitby, Ontario, as well as principal of the high school of the town.

OVERFLOW CLINIC TO-MORROW AFTERNOON.

So many showed interest in the Clinics yesterday and to-day that an overflow Baby Clinic has been arranged for to-morrow (Thursday) afternoon in the Goldfields Annex at 1.30 p.m. Mothers who were unable to bring their children to the Clinic on Tuesday and Wednesday are invited to attend the Clinic to-morrow afternoon. The Clinic to-morrow, like those on Tuesday and Wednesday, is under the auspices of the local Board of Health. The Provincial nurses at present in town will be in attendance and local doctors will also be present. All mothers with children under school age should take advantage of these Clinics in the interests of their children.
