MINISTER OF AGRICULTURE VISITS PART OF NORTH

Last week Hon. Manning Doherty was a visitor to some parts of the North Land, including Iroquois Falls and Liskeard. He was accompanied by Mrs. Doherty and their two sons, and they travelled by private car. They reached the Falls Thursday evening and stayed overnight. They were met at the station by representatives of the Company and the Town and taken to the mill where they were received by the manager, Mr. R. A. McInnis, and shown through the plant. They were delighted with their visit, especially with the floral beauties of the civic centre, the lawns and homes.

HELPING TO SPREAD THE FAME OF THE NORTH LAND

A party of U.S. publishers of important newspapers visited Iroquois Falls over the week-end. The party included representatives of the Detroit News, Cleveland Plaindealer, Grand Rapids Press, Pittsburgh Gazette, Pittsburgh Times and Chronicle Journal, Chicago Journal of Commerce, and other newspapers of high standing. The representatives of the newspapers were accompanied by their ladies. The trip combined pleasure and business. A thorough inspection was made of the Abitibi Company plant. All were much pleased and greatly impressed with the visit to the North. Visits like these undoubtedly help to spread the fame of the great North Land.

TWO MONTHS SENTENCE AFTER TWO YEARS REPRIEVE

After escaping sentence for close to two years, Clarence Burke last week started to serve a two months' sentence at North Bay. The story in brief is told as follows in the last issue of the Northern News, of Cobalt: "Nearly two years after he jumped his bail Clarence Burke wanted by the police of this district on a charge of being in illegal possession of ore, again fell into the clutches of the law and he is now in North Bay on a two months' sentence, after he had admitted his guilt. On September 24, 1920, Burke was arrested by J. D. Mackay, then constable for Coleman township, and by Chief Pareher at that time an officer on the Cobalt force. He appeared before Magistrate Atkinson, elected to go to a higher court and was released on \$500 bail. It was alleged by the Crown that he had possession illegally of seven bags of silver ore, valued at approximately \$1,100, the property of the LaRose Mines for whom he was working at the time. When the case was called for trial Burke did not appear and the bail money was estreated. The other day information was received that Burke was employed at the Hollinger under an assumed name, and after identification, he was arrested and brought to Haileybury. On Monday he came before Judge Hartman, pleaded guilty to the charge, and was sentenced to two months in jail. LaRose regained possession of the ore. At the time he was first arrested Burke was engaged at the University Mine."

REBEKAHS HAVE PLEASING MOONLIGHT SAIL EVENT

On Thursday evening last the Rebekahs held a very enjoyable evening sail party on the Steamer Minga. There were between forty and fifty Rebekahs, and Oddfellows and their friends in the party and the trip, despite the weather, was thoroughly enjoyed by all. The party left the landing here at about 7.45, and the boat went up the river about ten miles. The heavy rain that came on before the trip was finished sent all under cover, but could not dampen the enthusiasm of the happy crowd. During the trip popular songs were sung and a general good time enjoyed. On returning to the landing the party went to the hospitable home of Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Sheppard where a fine lunch was served. A feature of the evening was the presentation by the Rebekahs of a handsome emblematic pin to Mrs. Leng. Mrs. Keene read the address and Miss Nevada McCarthy made the presentation on behalf of the sisters. Dancing was also enjoyed by the party and all voted it a very pleasing evening from start to finish.

SURE, "ANYTHING'S GOOD ENOUGH FOR THE NORTH"

Last week Hon. Manning Doherty, Minister of Agriculture, visited the North Land, and occasion was taken of the visit to interview him regarding a more suitable building for the North Land at the Toronto National Exhibition. The New Liskeard Speaker, usually very friendly towards the Government and inclined to "speak softly" at all times, is by no means pleased with the attitude of Mr. Doherty. In this connection The Speaker says:—

"At the recent meeting of the Associated Boards of Trade, Mr. John McFarlane, Mr. Jemmett and Mr. Dewar were appointed a committee to arrange for a more attractive place at the Canadian National Exhibition for Temiskaming products. The idea was that the Northland would have an exhibit of minerals, pulp, paper, etc., and a more attractive place in which to place these exhibits was required. Mr. McFarlane took advantage of the Minister's presence to interview him in regard to this matter. However, Mr. McFarlane got not the least satisfaction. Mr. Doherty said the building now being used was all that could be desired; that he had received thousands of letters speaking of the splendid exhibits of the north. Mr. Doherty was most emphatic in his opinion that the building as well as its location was perfect. The writer has visited every fair in Toronto since the Government building for Northern Ontario products was erected, and we have to say that we differ very materially from Mr. Doherty in regard to this building and its location; but we quite agree with the Hon. gentleman as to the excellence of the exhibits which are placed in the building."
