MATHESON LADY KILLED WHILE WALKING ON TRACK

Thursday afternoon last Mrs. Leavy of Matheson, was killed by the Continental Limited while walking on the railway track about quarter of a mile south of Matheson station. Mrs. Leavy, who was quite deaf, apparently did not hear the approach of the train, and the engineer could not stop the train in time to avoid hitting her. She was killed instantly. Coroner F. C. Evans of South Porcupine was called to Matheson to hold an inquest.

DOZEN DRUNKS FINED AT THURSDAY'S COURT

Thursday last was a busy day for Magistrate Atkinson at the police court here. There were a dozen drunks picked up the week previous and of these nine paid \$10.00 and costs each, and one was taxed \$20.00 and costs for being particularly objectionable while under the influence. The other two of the dozen had a bottle on them when taken in charge and so it cost these two \$20.00 and costs each.

The cases under the town by-law regarding parking cars for hire were remanded to this week. Under this by-law, Messrs. McGregor, Hamilton, and Taylor and Killings were charged with breach of the regulations. Geo. Emond, a Dalton driver, was also charged with driving a car without the proper markers. In addition this week D. Mahoney will be added to the list of those charged with breach of the by-law regarding parking for hire on the street.

Charged with driving an automobile while under the influence of intoxicants T. P. King was sentenced to seven days at North Bay, with hard labour. The case was not contested but Mr. Gordon H. Gauthier made a strong plea for his client on the grounds of his high personal character and useful services to the community, to which the Magistrate replied that the law left no option in such a case.

P. Kris, charged by Sanitary Inspector Roy, with not supplying the proper sanitary cans on his premises, was fined \$5.00 and costs.

Steve Kari, for pumping a cesspool into a laneway, also had to pay \$10.00 and costs for this breach of the health and sanitation regulations.

Two women from Moneta figured in an assault case, the condition of the one woman's head and face showing that there had been an assault all right. The accused said that the other woman had made objectionable remarks about her and accordingly the "trimming up" had ensued. The Magistrate evidently considered that even women should not thus take the law into their own hands, and that the assault was perhaps a little too strenuous to be visited on a woman with a baby in her arms, so the accused was fined \$20.00 and costs.

SPECIAL MEETING CALLED OF THE PORCUPINE V.N.T.

A meeting of the shareholders of the Porcupine V.N.T. has been called for Saturday of next week, July 22nd. At this meeting shareholders will be asked to consider, and, if approved, to ratify the arrangement made by the directors whereby the capital stock of the company will be reduced to two million shares of one dollar each par value. Under this arrangement, one million shares of the two million thus established will be available for distribution to present shareholders in exchange for their present stock, on the basis of three old shares for one of the new. The other million shares will go into the treasury. It is understood that a third of this treasury stock has already been underwritten at 40 cents per share and that shareholders will later be given the right to subscribe for the other two-thirds at 40 cents per share, in proportion to their present holdings. The underwriting referred to will provide approximately \$133,000, and this amount is said to be sufficient to carry on the further development necessary and to get the mill in

operation. The further funds obtained from the balance of the treasury stock expected to be taken up by present shareholders should provide ample working capital, while the capitalization is kept down. At first, present shareholders were inclined to be critical of the plan as it reduced their holdings in shares, but it is understood that the advantages of the plan are now being more generally recognized and that it is finding very encouraging support upon consideration. The announcement of the proposal had the effect of causing a drop in the price of V.N.T. shares on the market, but a full recovery is expected as soon as the proposed new adjustment is completed and its advantages become apparent.

Good progress is being made at the V.N.T. A station has been cut at the 750-foot level and lateral work there will be taken up very shortly. In the meantime the main shaft is to be continued to the 900-foot level. All the development work is being carried along with very satisfactory results and if the proposed arrangements are carried through successfully, operations will be carried along without a break, and, it is confidently believed, to ultimate pleasing success.
