AVERAGE TEMPERATURE IN JUNE, AND IT WAS DRY

The following is the official report of the weather for June as given in The Haileyburian by Mr. Paul A. Cobbold, who is in charge of the Government Observatory at the County Town:—

The fine, dry weather of May continued through the first week in June. On the 10th the weather turned considerably cooler with showers, but no very heavy falls of rain. On the 11th a large depression passed across Ontario bringing a northwest gale in its rear, which caused the temperature to fall and gave frost in many places on the 13th; the damage being done by the frost being increased by the violence of the wind, which reached a velocity of 40 miles per hour on the 12th. The cold spell lasted till the 18th, when warmer conditions set in, culminating in the maximum for the month of 94.0 on the 14th, when another decided "low" gave strong southwest winds. On the afternoon of the 24th a strong northwest wind set in, which cooled the air so rapidly that by the morning of the 25th, the temperature had dropped to 38.0, a fall of 56 degrees in about 14 hours. The rest of the month was fine except for a slight shower on the 27th. There was a second slight frost nearby on the 26th.

The mean temperature of the month was 62.0, one degree above the normal; the highest 94 on the 24th, and the lowest, 33.9 on the 13th. The absolute maximum and minimum temperatures in the past 29 years were 100.1 in 1911, and 28.2 in 1897.

The rainfall was 1.25 inches, 1.65 inches below the average and the fourth driest year in 29, 1896 with 1.18, 1908 with 0.72 and 1919 with 0.75 being slightly drier. There were nine days with a measurable quantity of rain.

Bright sunshine was 276 hours, 24 hours more than the average. Thunder was recorded on the 3rd, 6th, 7th, and 14th. None of the storms were severe. Probably the absence of thunderstorms was due to the dryness of the atmosphere. While the growth was checked by the cool weather of the second ten days of the month, the moisture in the ground has helped the crop.

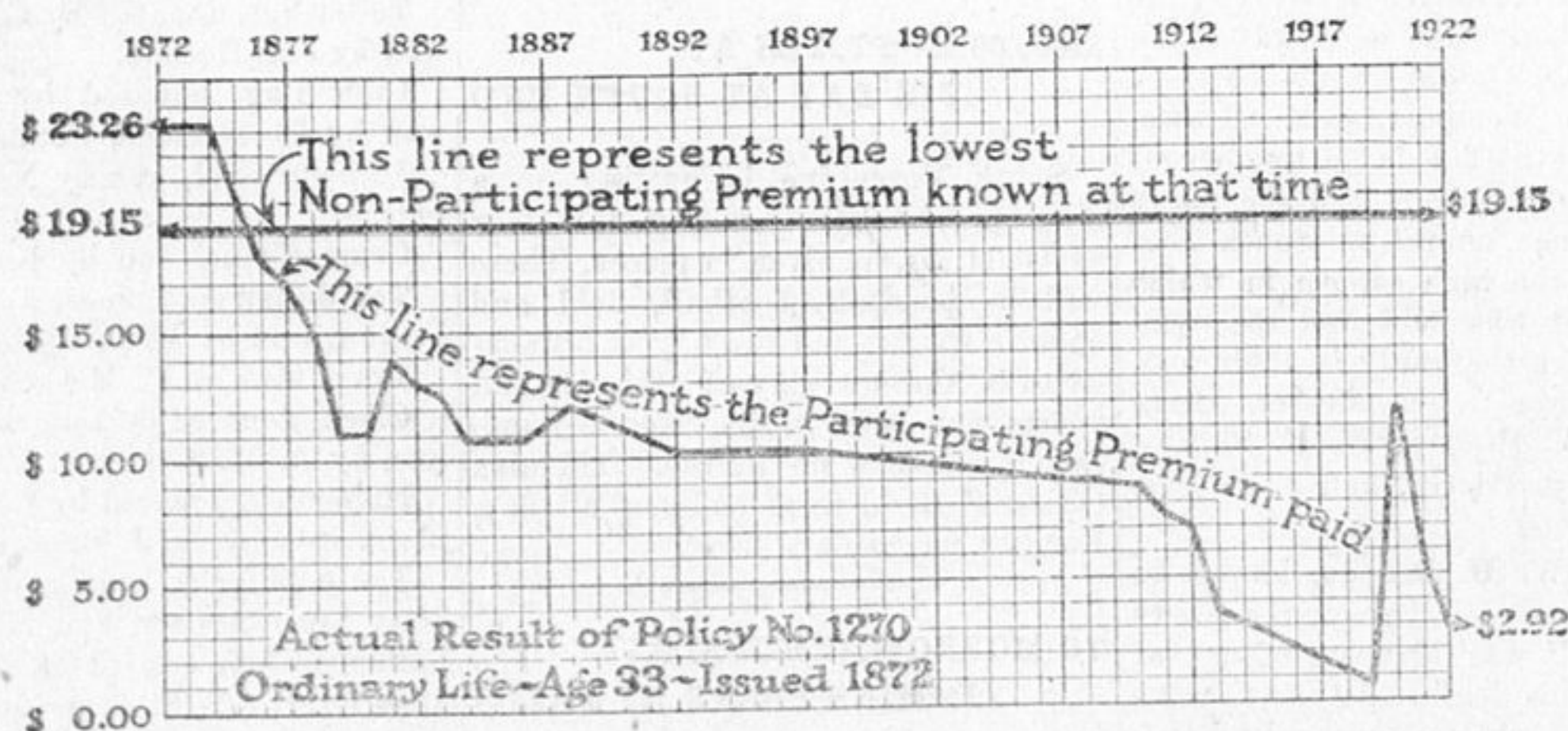

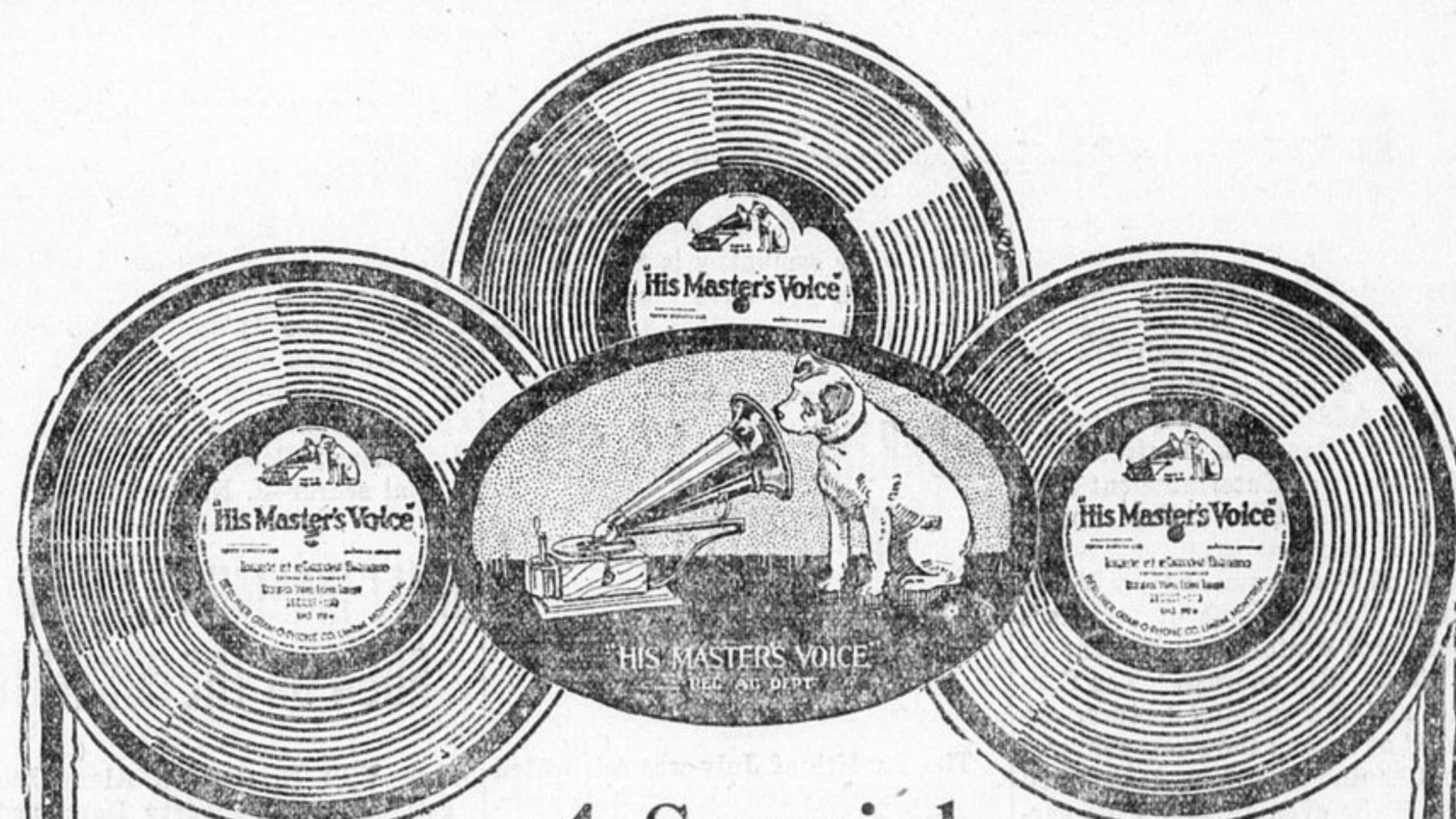
