Timmins Chautauqua is in progress this week, afternoons and evenings, to-day, Thursday, Friday and Saturday. In the Chautauqua the L.O.D.E. have provided a remarkable series of attractive entertainments at a very low rate of admission. By securing a season ticket, each entertainment actually costs less than 30c., while the regular price for the type of entertainment would be at least \$1.00.

In the annual report of the Northern Academy at Monteith, as submitted to the Department of Education, Mr. Johnson, the principal, says: "In view of the fact that a large percentage of the settlers coming into Northern Ontario are French it is advisable that the teachers in our Public Schools should be able to speak French. To this end conversation French is taught. We have been fortunate in securing a teacher whose native language is French to take up this branch of the work."

Timmins Football Club has entered a challenge for the Foster Cup now held by Kirkland Lake. The final games to decide the holder this year will be played at Kirkland Lake.

The play "It Pays to Advertise," put on by an excellent company at the Chautauqua Thursday (tomorrow) evening is a regular stage play with three actors and four actresses in the cast.

Hon. Harry Mills, Minister of Mines, intends to make a tour of the mining areas of Northern Ontario this summer. He will visit all the active mines and also many of the areas where at present there is no active work being done.

The Pas (Manitoba) Herald last week says: "Jack Callinan's services as leader of the choir at Flin-Flon were sadly missed. Jawn's voice might not be quite equal to John McCormick's, but what it lacks in quality it makes up in volume."

The Ontario Gazette announces the incorporation of the Porcupine Creek Mines Limited, with head office in Toronto. The capital stock is three million shares of \$1.00 each par value. The provisional directors are: P. J. Dwyer, G. H. Holland, J. L. MacKay and J. J. Gray, of Toronto.

The second annual Regatta of the Timmins Citizen's Band is to be held on Thursday afternoon, July 27th. Everyone should make a special note of the date.

Cobalt has secured permission from the O.A.B.A. to have the Hillierests of Toronto play in the Silver Town next month, likely on August 7th. The baseball authorities of the Province had recently been quoted as banning the teams along the T. & N. O. as not being fully in amateur standing, but apparently the difficulties have been sweetly smoothed away.

A letter addressed, "The Crown Lands Agent, Ontario," was delivered last week to Mr. N. J. McAuley, Haileybury, and all the Haileyburians have their chests out, believing that this is proof that the postal authorities consider the County Town the one town in the Province. The letter was mailed at a small town in Nova Scotia.

The question of a new public school for Haileybury is to be submitted to the ratepayers of the County Town on Aug. 3rd, in the form of a by-law to raise \$45,000.00 for the purpose. The Haileybury Council did not grant the requisition in the ordinary way, claiming the Town could not finance the proposition. So the other plans were inaugurated by the School Board of Haileybury to secure the money. The by-law has been approved by the Railway and Municipal Board.

Mr. Gene Colombo leaves on Monday next for an extended visit to the south. He will go to Detroit first, and later to Palm Beach. His many friends in the Camp will wish him a happy time and a return here before too long.
