Official figures show that the Dome Mines for the first six months of 1922 (8), 2.15 p.m. practically doubled its output for 1921. Up to June 30th, 1922 the pro- 2.20 p.m. duction for the year was \$1,973,000, as against \$939,000 for the same period (6), 2.25 p.m. last year. The recovery per ton averaged \$11 to \$12 per ton, as against \$6 to \$7 for the first six months of 1921.
