

**BY-LAW No. 8**

**A BY-LAW OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE ROMAN Catholic Separate Schools for the Town of Timmins, to raise by way of loan the sum of \$26,000.00 for the purposes therein mentioned.**

WHEREAS the Board of Trustees of the Roman Catholic Separate Schools for the Town of Timmins require to borrow the sum of \$26,000.00 to provide funds for the purpose of acquiring a school site in the said Town of Timmins and erecting a school building thereon, and for such purpose to issue debentures therefor, bearing interest at the rate of Six per cent. per annum, which is the amount of the debt intended to be created by this by-law;

AND WHEREAS it is expedient to make the principal of the said debt repayable in yearly sums, during the period of fifteen years, of such amounts respectively that the aggregate amount payable for principal and interest in any year shall be equal as nearly as may be to the amount so payable for principal and interest in each of the other years;

AND WHEREAS it will be necessary to raise annually the sum of \$2,677.03 during the period of fifteen years to pay for said yearly sums of principal and interest as they become due.

AND WHEREAS the amount of the whole rateable property rateable for Separate School purposes in the said Town of Timmins, according to the last revised assessment roll, is \$1,085,180.00.

AND WHEREAS the amount of the existing debenture debt of the Board of Trustees of the Roman Catholic Separate Schools for the Town of Timmins is \$40,000.00 and no part of the principal or interest is in arrear.

NOW THEREFORE The Board of Trustees of the Roman Catholic Separate Schools for the Town of Timmins ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:—

1. That for the purpose aforesaid there shall be borrowed the sum of \$26,000.00 and debentures shall be issued therefor in sums of not less than \$100.00 each, bearing interest at the rate of Six per cent. per annum, and having coupons attached thereto for the payment of interest.

2. The debentures shall all bear the same date and shall be issued within one year after the date on which this by-law is passed, and may bear any date within such year, and shall be payable in fifteen annual instalments during the fifteen years next after the time when the same are issued and the respective amounts of principal and interest payable in each of the said years shall be as set forth in Schedule "A" hereto which is hereby declared to be and form part of this By-Law.

3. The debentures as to both principal and interest may be expressed in Canadian currency and may be payable at any place or places in Canada or Great Britain.

4. The Chairman of the said Board shall sign and issue the debentures and interest coupons, and the same shall also be signed by the Secretary-Treasurer of the said Board, and the debentures shall be sealed with the Corporate Seal of the said Board.

5. During fifteen years, the currency of the debentures, the sum of \$2,677.03 shall be raised annually for the payment of the debt and interest and said sum of \$2,677.03 shall be annually included in the yearly Separate School rate to be levied and collected by the said Board for the said fifteen years, the currency of the said debentures, and the said sum of \$2,677.03 shall be levied and collected annually by a special rate sufficient therefor over and above all other rates in the same manner and form and from the like persons and property by, from, upon or out of which other Separate School rates are levied, raised and collected, for the said period of fifteen years.

6. The said sum of \$26,000.00 so borrowed and interest thereon and the said debentures shall be and the same are hereby made a charge upon the Schoolhouse property and premises and on the real and personal property vested in the said Board of Trustees of the Roman Catholic Separate Schools for the Town of Timmins, and upon all the Separate School rates of the said Board to be hereafter imposed until the said debentures and each and every of them, together with all interest thereon, shall have been fully paid and satisfied.

7. The said Debentures may contain any clause providing for the registration thereof authorized by any Statute relating to Municipal debentures in force at the time of the issue thereof.

**COCHRANE MAN TO STAND TRIAL ON MURDER CHARGE**

Geo. Arthur Wilde Tells Coroner's Jury Details of Tragedy on July 12th.

Last week the coroner's jury in the inquest into the death of Mrs. Arthur Wilde on July 12th returned the following verdict:—"That Lillian Wilde came to her death on the 12th of July, between the hours of 12.30 p.m. and 1.30 p.m. from a wound in the head caused by a blow probably given by Arthur Wilde, at her home on 2nd Avenue, Cochrane, Ontario." The witnesses at the inquest were:—the husband of the dead woman, Arthur Wilde; Robert Wells, a prospector, who was at the Wilde home at the time of the tragedy; Mr. S. J. Dempsey, who testified to Wilde's affection for his wife as expressed to

him when the man visited his office after the tragedy in order to surrender to the law; Mrs. Waldron, a neighbor, who also referred to the evident love of Wilde for his wife and children; and Drs. Fraser and Biron who gave medical testimony to the effect that the woman had met death through a terrific blow from an axe, her skull being fractured and her brain lacerated and spattered over the wall behind the chair on which she was sitting when the doctors arrived on the scene of the tragedy. The woman lived less than an hour after the blow and never regained consciousness.

Wilde's story to the jury was given under the protection of the court and will not be used against him in his trial for the killing of his wife. He said that he reached home shortly after 12.30. He was not expected. He found the door locked, but thought his family had gone out, so he let himself in with his latch key. He started through the house when his wife ran out of the front room in her night

dress and tried to hold him back. He asked her "what's going on here," and pushed past. He saw Wells lying on the bed in the front room," and then," he told the jury, "my head was gone, and I followed my wife to the kitchen and possibly struck with the axe." Then he attacked Wells in the front room, striking at him three or four times. He then went to Mr. Dempsey's office to give himself up.

Wells, in his evidence, largely corroborated the account given by the husband. He admitted having had improper relations with Mrs. Wilde. He had known the Wilde family since 1915. He was to assist in building an addition to the Wilde home and at Wilde's suggestion had visited the house the previous evening in this connection. Wells had his arm broken and received other injuries from the attack made on him by the incensed husband.

At the preliminary hearing before Magistrate Tucker on Thursday morning last the evidence of all the wit-

nesses at the inquest, except that of Wilde, was accepted without repetition. Wilde had the protection of the court. Wilde on a charge of murdering his wife was committed by Magistrate Tucker for trial at the fall assizes in Haileybury next December. Wells was held on the magistrate's order as a material witness, but will be allowed his liberty if he can provide \$4000.00 cash bail. Both Wilde and Wells seemed to feel their position keenly and to be under severe mental strain.

**TIMMINS MAN WINS \$500.00 FORESTRY ESSAY PRIZE**

The following despatch appearing in southern papers during the past few days explains itself. His friends here will congratulate Mr. Swanson on his successful work in winning the prize and also on the publicity naturally coming to Timmins through his success in this line. The despatch reads: "P. Swanson of Timmins has been announced winner of \$500, first prize

in the Essay contest on practical forestry for which \$1000 was offered by F. Barnjum of Montreal. It is also announced that the success of the contest was sufficient to warrant a series for which increasing amounts in prizes will be offered from year to year. Ninety per cent. of the 225 essays which were sent in from all over Canada urged an embargo, or a heavy export tax, on pulpwood shipped from the country. Eighty per cent. called for a permit system for all persons entering the woods, such as has been inaugurated in the province of Quebec and the same percentage advocated electrification of railways as an aid in reducing forest fire risk."

While being taken from Ville Marie to Bryson, Que., to serve a term in jail Peter Kusick, a Russian sentenced to a year's imprisonment for striking a railway construction foreman with an iron bar, last week jumped from the steamer Meteor into Lake Temiskaming and was drowned before the boat could be stopped and help given him.
