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SCORER AT IROQUOIS FALLS NEEDS TO STUDY RULES

Writing on the report in The Broke Hustler last week of the district baseball game at the Falls, a correspondent put the matter this way:—

Destefano should certainly get credit for a hit in the 7th. innings, as his grounder was fielded cleanly and the play made at third base, the runner reaching the bag safely. No error was credited on the play. Then why not allow Johnny a hit? It is his by right and he should get credit for same.

On the other hand, the Iroquois Falls scorer allows Anson a hit in the 9th. innings on what should have been a very easy out only for Duncan's error pure and simple, and but for that Tate probably would have had a shut-out. Therefore, Iroquois Falls did not get an earned run. On the other hand Timmins got three earned runs in the 8th. on a triple by Duncan, singles by Tate and Pierce, and a sacrifice by McIntyre. If you will take the trouble to look up the rule book, Mr. Iroquois Falls scorer, you will notice that any man getting on a bag either through a walk or being hit by a pitched ball and then scores on a hit is a run earned.

GEOLOGICAL SURVEY MAKE REPORT ON LARDER LAKE

A report on the Larder Lake district, Ontario, by Dr. H. C. Cooke, has been published by the Geological Survey. This presents the results of a detailed study of the geology of McVittie and McGarry townships including the auriferous belt lying to the north of the lake. The report is accompanied by a geological map on a scale of 2 inches to 1 mile. Bound with the report on Larder Lake is a report by Dr. Cooke on the Kenogami Lake and Round Lake areas. Maps of Holmes, Bart, Eby, Otto and Boston townships and of parts of Dunmore, Bompas, Cronfoll, Flavelle, Gross, Blain, Marquis and Paeand townships accompany the report. Copies of the report or of the separate maps may be had by applying to the Director Geological Survey, Ottawa.

RAND'S NEW REFINERY NOW HANDLING TON GOLD A DAY

With the comment that the Rand is by no means dead yet a friend of The Advance sends the following interesting clipping:—

"In the course of his valedictory address at Johannesburg as retiring President of the South African Institute of Engineers, Mr. C. R. Atkinson declared that the Rand gold refinery would be "the finest in the world." South Africa, he said, produced approximately 8,000,000 ozs. of gold, valued, in normal times, with the price of gold round about 85s. per ounce, at £34,000,000 annually. The refinery now in operation had sufficient capacity to deal with this quantity. To put the matter in another form, something like 2,400,000 tons of rock were mined annually to produce about 270 tons of gold, so that each working day nearly a ton of precious metal was obtained. Therefore, the new refinery would be receiving and issuing each day 1 ton of gold."
