Timmins and District Notes

The T. & N. O. Railway Commission paid a brief visit to Timmins last week on their regular tour of inspection of the line.

The next regular meeting of the Timmins Town Council is scheduled for Monday afternoon of next week, Aug. 7th.

August 19th is the date this year for the annual Picnic of the T. & N. O. Employees, to be held at New Liskeard Beach.

The Tonopah Mining Co. of Nevada are working the Herriek property in the West Shiningtree area under an option.

Friday of this week, August 4th, is Civic Holiday in both Timmins and Tisdale. This allows all in the district to enjoy the Big Day at South Porcupine.

It is reported that the New Liskeard Senior ball team have found it necessary to drop out of the Temiskaming Baseball League this summer.

Among the recent incorporations announced by the Ontario Gazette is that of the Shaw Porcupine Gold Mines Limited, head office Toronto, and capitalization of \$3,000,000.00.
