**SPECIAL MEETING OF PORC. CROWN WEDNESDAY**

A special meeting of the shareholders of the Porcupine Crown Mines has been called for Aug. 10, for the purpose of considering two by-laws to be submitted by the directors. One plan is to increase the capital to \$4,000,000, and the other is to purchase the assets of the Northerown Mines which is the holding company for the merged properties of the Porcupine Crown and Thompson-Krist.

The vice-president of the Porcupine Crown gives the following explanation:—

Your directors have approved of an offer being made to the Northerown Porcupine Mines, Limited, for the purchase of the property, mines, equipment and other assets of the company by the cancelling of the outstanding obligations and commitments due to your company to the amount of \$160,000, and the issue of 600,000 shares of one dollar each of the increased capital stock of your company. The directors of your company have also approved of an application being made to the Ontario Government to increase its capital stock to 4,000,000 shares, of which 1,400,000

shares would remain in the treasury, to be sold to provide working capital, and 600,000 shares handed to the Northerown Porcupine Mines, Limited, in payment of balance of purchase price of its property and assets, as set forth above.

Your directors feel that this will be the most equitable way of meeting the situation that has arisen, through the lack of working capital, to enable the company to complete thorough exploration of the properties of the Northerown Porcupine Mines, Limited. Being closely situated to the valuable areas of the Hollinger Mines, Limited, and owing to the favorable showings recently opened up in the western part of your property, your directors feel warranted in recommending further development work.

**GOOD STRIKE REPORTED AT PORCUPINE CROWN**

Interest was roused this week by the report of a good strike at the Porcupine Crown in the workings now under way at the 500-ft. level. The strike is said to be a very promising one and to indicate that the present operations are meeting with much success.

**IROQUOIS FALLS BASEBALL TEAM HERE NEXT THURSDAY**

In the district baseball series Iroquois Falls will play here on Thursday of next week, Aug. 17th. It will be a good game. Up to date in the second half of the district schedule Timmins, Iroquois Falls and Cochrane each have a win to their credit, with another "called" game between the Falls and Cochrane to be played off again if it affects the standing. By doubling the score on Cochrane last Saturday the Falls showed they are still very much in the reckoning, so the game on Thursday of next week should be a lively one.

An item in The Advance last week suggested that Cochrane had won the first half of the series. This is credited to Cochrane with more than is coming to them. There are four wins credited to Cochrane for the first half of the series and three wins for Timmins, but there is also a tie game between Cochrane and Timmins to be settled, and if this should be won by Timmins, Cochrane and Timmins would be tied for first place in the first half. Timmins thus has a chance and the players are sure that it is a very good chance, of winning the first

half of the series. For the second half Timmins also has good chances, while the Falls also is much in the running. Accordingly the coming game between the old-time ball rivals is likely to be a specially interesting one.

The formal opening of the new Salvation Army hall on Fourth Avenue, opposite the public school, took place, with special services Saturday evening and Sunday. Lieut.-Col. Miller, of Toronto, and Brigadier McAmmond of North Bay, were present for the opening. The Salvation Army now have a fine new meeting place that was erected in record time.

Monday at 1 p.m. an alarm was sent in from Box 34, and a very prompt response made by the Fire Brigade, about 20 members being present in less time than it takes to tell it. The fire was in a shed at the rear of a lot on Fifth Avenue between Birch and Maple street. The cause of the fire is unknown, but boys with matches are suspected as causing the blaze which had good headway before being discovered. The damage done by the fire was not material, thanks to the good work of the Brigade under Deputy Chief W. G. Smith.
