JUDGMENT AGAINST SIR
CHAS. ROSS IN MINING CASE

Judgment against Sir Chas. Ross, whereby he loses a third interest in four mining claims in Temiskaming District, is announced as having been given by Mr. T. E. Godson, K.C., Mining Commissioner, in the action brought some time ago by Mrs. C. A. O'Connell, of Ottawa, and Mr. J. J. Hollinger, of Haileybury, to secure full possession of mining rights of the properties concerned.

THE GOVERNMENT'S
CONVERSION SCHEME

The attention of the holders of the five and a half per cent war loan bonds maturing December 1, 1922, is directed to the offer of the Minister of Finance to renew the loan on favourable terms. The last Canadian loan was placed in New York at a satisfactory price. The Minister is making his present financial operation entirely a domestic one by offering to exchange the maturing bonds for new bonds bearing the same rate of interest, running for either five years or ten years as the bondholder may prefer. A further inducement to the investor is that he receives a bonus of one month's interest. The terms offered are decidedly favourable to the investor and it is probable that a large part of the maturing loan will be renewed. Arrangements for the exchange of the bonds can be made at any branch of the chartered banks. Holders who do not wish to reinvest will be paid in cash on the 1st. December.

ACCUSED OF DEFRAUDING
CREDITORS; GIVEN 6 MONTHS

Last week at North Bay Judge Valin sentenced John Pitt to three months in jail on a charge of removing goods from his store with intent to defraud his creditors, and another three months for failing to keep the books and accounts required by law in the case of credit businesses. Pitt had a fire in his North Bay store on June 11th, and a couple of days afterwards he made an assignment. An investigation into the fire revealed the fact that goods had been shipped to a Mrs. J. Ostraka in Timmins, the lady being understood to be a sister of Pitt. Mrs. Ostraka and a man here were arrested in connection with the case and have yet to be tried by a judge on charges arising from the procedure. The stock in Pitt's store, it is claimed, was arranged in such a way, as to leave the impression that nothing had been shipped away, one garment in a box and empty boxes on the shelves. Pitt denied that he had ever shipped the goods from his store and also claimed that he had no relatives in Timmins. The Judge, however, found the cases clear, against him and he received the total of six months in jail. A further charge of arson against him in connection with the fire at his store was withdrawn.

T. & N. O. RAILWAY TO HAVE
ANOTHER SURPLUS THIS YEAR

According to a report from Ottawa, Colonel L. T. Martin, a member of the T. & N. O. Commission says the provincial government's railway will show a surplus at the end of the year, despite unsettled conditions. He bases his opinion on the encouraging volume of traffic that has been handled for several months and the prospects for future business.

Col. Martin says there are fine prospects for a bumper crop in the country along the T. & N. O. which is rapidly becoming a successful agricultural country. The general aspect of prosperity up here is brighter now than it has been for some time, according to the Commissioner who says the members of the Commission returned from their recent trip very

much encouraged with conditions generally.

Work on the Oil Can extension is proceeding as quickly as possible, the Ottawa report states. In the last two or three weeks the contractors have made good progress. The track is now laid to the first crossing of the Abitibi River, 13 miles from Cochrane, and part of this track has been ballasted sufficiently well to enable a bridge of other heavy material to be moved over the new line. It is expected the second crossing of the Abitibi will be reached before the snow flies next winter.

Cobalt Town Council is again complete by the qualifying of Mr. James Hylands for the vacancy on the Board. Mr. Hylands was away at Swastika at the time of his nomination, but under an amendment to the Municipal Act Mr. R. L. O'Gorman qualified on his behalf.
