J. JONES WORKING ON COAL CLAIMS NORTH OF COCHRANE

In a letter received this week from Mr. J. Jones, the well-known North Land prospector, reference is made to the coal claims north of Cochrane. Mr. Jones writes:—"I have just come out to Cochrane. I have some men 150 miles north of Cochrane, being south of Moose Factory, working a coal property where there are large bodies of coal. Quite large bodies of it can be seen sticking out of the river banks, the seam being three to fourteen feet thick. I staked this coal two years ago. The new James Bay railroad will run quite close to the property when the extension is completed. The Government have had men in the area and give a good report on it. I will send you a copy of the Government Report. The oil shale looks good, running about 6 per cent. in oil in the formation. There have been good oil discoveries west of Moose Factory by Messrs. Le Duke and Snipe. The Moose Factory country is a very good one to prospect. It is, of course, a hard country in parts of the thick bush. The new railroad has the right-of-way cut through 46 miles. The steel is laid 13 miles from Cochrane now. They have large gangs of men putting the steel down. I am going to film some parts of this railroad and some of the coal grounds and the layout of the country, and other features of the Moose Factory and James Bay area and will loan the motion picture films to the Town of Timmins, the proceeds to go to the Porcupine Dog Race. I hope at the next Dog Race to have three good teams and that it will be a longer race. I have over 20 dogs on hand now."

FORESTRY EXHIBIT CAR AT TIMMINS THIS WEEK

Canadian Forestry Association on Annual Tour to Show Importance of Forests and Forest Products.

For a number of years past the Canadian Forestry Association has toured the Dominion each year with a special car exhibiting the forest products and possibilities of Canada and giving pamphlets, lectures, etc., relative to the forest industry, forest protection, etc. For two or three years past Timmins has been included in the centres to be visited and each year the public have found the visit of the Forestry Car both helpful and interesting. This year the trip through the North Land is now in progress. On Friday of this week, August 18th, the car will be in Matheson; on Aug. 19th and 20th in Timmins; in Iroquois Falls on Aug. 21; and in Cochrane on Tuesday, Aug. 22. On the 23rd. the car will go to Jacksonboro, then to Fauquier, Moonbeam and Hearst, staying a day in each place.

The Forestry Car in previous years has been a noteworthy centre of interest here. This year the car has been completely changed and in view of the importance of the forestry industry to Canada should prove of especial interest. The exhibits in car this year are more numerous than in past years. They indicate the growth of the industries centered around Canada's forest wealth, as well as paying very needed attention to matters relative to forest protection. The car is one of the methods used by the Canadian Forestry Association to increase and foster interest and attention in Canada's forests. No charge of any sort is made the public for the exhibits which include an open air moving picture demonstration on Forest Fire Prevention.

SPECIAL EXHIBIT FOR NORTH REFUSED BY C.N.E.

Despatches from the south last week gave the information that Mr. D. L. Jemmett, of Haileybury, representing the Associated Boards of Trade of Temiskaming, who was in Toronto recently in connection with the attempt of the Associated Boards to secure extra accommodation at the Canadian National Exhibition for a special exhibit from Temiskaming, reports that he has failed in his mission, the officials of the C.N.E. having decided that they were unable to provide the extra space required. This will mean that the \$500 donated by the T. & N.O. Commission to assist in this object will likely be returned.

IROQUOIS FALLS TO PLAY BASEBALL HERE TOMORROW

PRACTICE FOOTBALL GAME SATURDAY OF THIS WEEK.

As a practice game in preparation for the Foster Cup match here on August 24th, there is to be a football practice event here on Saturday of this week between two picked teams which will include all the players in the Cup feature. This will be a football game well worth seeing. The kick off will be at 6 p.m. sharp on the athletic grounds.

MAGISTRATE TUCKER AT POLICE COURT LAST WEEK

In the absence of Magistrate Atkinson on holiday, police court last week was presided over by Magistrate Tucker of Cochrane. In addition to a couple of simple drunk charges, there was an assault case heard. Mr. M. J. Tinkess charged F. Horn with assault. Mr. Tinkess gave evidence to the effect that after an argument Mr. Horn had assaulted him, also threatening further assault later. Mr. Horn denied the charge, asserting that he had pushed Mr. Tinkess away after the latter had put his hands on him.
