**STARTLING SHOOTING
AFFRAY HERE SATURDAY**

Mr. J. K. Moore Shot Twice by Unknown Assailant, but is Making Excellent Progress to Recovery.

While in his store on Saturday evening between eight and nine o'clock, Mr. J. K. Moore was shot twice by an unknown man, both bullets entering the breast but in such a way as to be only flesh wounds. Mr. Moore is making good progress to recovery and will be able to be up in a day or two. Neither bullet entered a vital place, and the wounds though painful are not dangerous. X-rays were made and the exact position, etc. of the bullets located. In a few days the bullets will be removed, but at present they are causing no danger or inconvenience.

At the time of the shooting the streets were crowded with people and there were also several in Mr. Moore's store, but the affair happened so quickly and unexpectedly that the harm was done before it was realized. Mr. Moore was able after the affair to tell the police what he knew in the matter. It seems that a stranger entered the store and engaged Mr. Moore in conversation regarding steamship fares and railroad rates. Eventually Mr. Moore went back to his office at the rear of the store to secure some rates or circulars. The stranger accompanied him. As Mr. Moore entered the rear room which was in darkness he thought he heard some one near the safe. As he has recently had his safe robbed twice, once of over \$50.00 and the other time of \$30.00, he turned the light on and made quickly to the safe. There was a man there and he grabbed him by one arm. The man put his one hand before his face and with the other drew a revolver, shooting two or three times, two of the shots taking effect. Some friends of Mr. Moore's, who were in the store at the time, rushed to the room but the man doing the shooting had escaped by the back door and the other had also gone, whether he had any connection with the affair or not. The police are working on the case, but as the men were strangers apparently without particular distinguishing marks the difficulty will be to get clues. Anyone who can give any information in the matter should see Acting Chief O'Connor at once. A revolver, believed to be the one with which the shooting was done, was found later in the yard behind the store. As a clue, however, its value is doubtful, as it is an ordinary Belgian army service revolver, a type of which there are no doubt hundreds around.

**MAINTAINS SUDBURY AREA
HAS GOOD COAL FIELD**

Last week Mr. A. F. A. Coyne, geologist, addressed a largely attended meeting of the Sudbury Board of Trade and ably presented his side of the question in regard to the suggested anthracite coal find in the Sudbury area. He disputed the statements of the Ontario Bureau of Mines officials as to there being no commercial body of anthracite coal in the Sudbury district. Showing samples of the rocks, Mr. Coyne stated that having first established that the first requisite of an anthracite field existed, and that the nickel range formed the required basin, such as found in known anthracite coal fields, he next turned to examining the geology, and found that the structural sequence of the geology together with the lithological character of the rocks compared equally with the best known anthracite coal regions. These consisted of sandstones, shales, and coal slates, following in order, and naturally he would expect coal to occur as next in the known geological series of a coal field. "It was on this interpretation of the actual occurrence in the field that I selected one point where no coal showed on the surface, and with a shot of dynamite exposed true anthracite coal just 18 inches below the surface," declared the speaker. He emphasized the fact that the coal discovered was the genuine anthracite or hard coal and ridiculed the alleged statement of the Department of Mines that there was only 100 tons of the coal in the whole district. For over 100 miles in area samples of coal had been coming. Mr. Coyne concluded an eloquent and forceful presentation of the case with the words: "When I see anthracite coal staring me in the face, and think of \$40,000,000 per year going over to the United States annually for anthracite coal, I feel it is the duty of any citizen to have the courage of his convictions and come out from the shoulder."

If I thought for one minute there were only a measly hundred tons of coal in the great basin at your doors, I would misjudge my Canada. This country gives an hundred fold of anything she shows at the surface. For this reason actual coal mining operations commenced yesterday, and some of your old timers who have preached the gospel of coal for these last twenty-five years may yet live to see the day when Ontario anthracite coal will be in the yards of Sudbury, and they will then be able to turn and say to those who doubted "I told you so."

Several who had special experience in coal and coal mining endorsed Mr. Coyne's statements to the Sudbury meeting. Samples of the coal, they pointed out, had been sent to various authorities and the returns were all anthracite coal. Mr. Wm. McVittie, acclaimed as the discoverer of anthracite at Sudbury and for twenty-five years past a believer in the possibilities of coal mining at Sudbury, spoke briefly, expressing his confidence that anthracite coal in commercial quantities will ultimately be found in the Chelmsford area near Sudbury.

**YOUNG MAN'S SAD DEATH
FOLLOWING ACCIDENT**

Mr. F. Martell, a young man about 25 years of age, employed underground at the Hollinger, died on Saturday morning in St. Mary's Hospital following an accident on Friday. An inquest was held on Monday and the evidence pointed to the idea that the accident was of the kind against which the mine has provided safeguards and protection. The unfortunate young man, it seems, was walking past a skip-way when a piece of rock fell down from above and hit him on the head. The gates, designed to prevent just such accidents, had apparently been left open, contrary to the implicit instructions of the mine. The young man's head was badly crushed, and he was at once taken to the hospital. Despite all that could be done by medical skill he passed away on Saturday morning. Following the inquest the Mining Inspector laid charges against two of the other workmen at the mine with a view to placing the responsibility for the open gate.

The funeral took place on Tuesday morning to the R.C. Cemetery, High Mass being said by Rev. Fr. Theriault. The deceased resided with his mother on Balsam street, and the deep sympathy of all goes out to the bereaved mother in her affliction.
