VISITOR FROM SOUTH MUCH IMPRESSED WITH TIMMINS
 Mr. G. A. Hemstreet, clerk and treasurer of Milton, Ontario, is spending a couple of weeks the guest of his daughter, Mrs. J. P. Bartleman, Spruce St. This is Mr. Hemstreet's first visit to the North Land and he expresses pleased surprise at the wonderful progress and possibilities of the country. He thinks it would be a revelation to the average man in the south to see and appreciate the importance of the mining industry here as evidenced by the big mines like the Hollinger, McIntyre and Dome and the promising newer properties in course of development. His attention has also been taken by the abundant evidences before him of the agricultural and forest wealth of this North Land. "What impresses me most, however," says Mr. Hemstreet, "is the idea of permanence there seems to be in your present extensive building programme. Fine, solid, permanent structures seem to be going up on every side. The people who are here, and ought to know, seem to have complete faith in the future of the town and district. Their evident faith in the country is contagious, especially when there are so many proofs on every hand that this faith is founded on a sound basis." Mr. Hemstreet will return to the south as a "booster" for Timmins and the North Land, a booster with facts, figures and knowledge to back up his faith in the great North Land.

Public School supporters in Cobalt this year will have a tax rate 12½ mills less than last year's rate, while the rate for Separate School supporters will be 7 mills less than last year. All this sounds good, until it is recalled that Cobalt's tax rate last year totalled 59½ mills for Public School and 69 mills for Separate School supporters. The general rate this year is 11 mills less than last year, so Cobalt is keeping expenses down all right.

TWO MEN INJURED FRIDAY WHILE SCALING AT MINE
 On Friday last while Messrs. W. Swain and T. Gloster were engaged in "scaling" at the Hollinger underground, one of them struck a crevice with some old powder left in it. The result was an explosion and in the accident Mr. Swain sustained bad cuts around the mouth and Mr. Gloster had his leg injured, an artery being cut, with consequent loss of blood. First aid was promptly given the injured men until the arrival of the doctor when their wounds were stitched and dressed and the men sent to their homes where they are making rapid progress to recovery from the injuries received in the accident.

INTERESTING CASE AT POLICE COURT THIS WEEK

At police court this week B. Cain, shift boss, and S. Joy, deck-hand, will be asked to answer to charges of failing to observe due care and precaution for the general safety in work at the mines. The charges arise from the accident last week in which F. Martel met injuries that resulted in his death. He was hit on the head by a piece of falling rock and the evidence at the inquest suggested that the accident would not have occurred had use been made of the safeguards provided by the mine. To provide against such accidents the mine has trap doors that employees are instructed strictly to keep closed when not in use. One of these trap-doors is said to have been left open. After the inquest the Mining Inspector laid the charges referred to.
 Other cases tomorrow will include charges against J. Keorse, E. Marcin and M. Makovitch of breach of the by-law regarding cows running at large. Chief O'Connor still watching the comfort and safety of the citizens in this matter. These cases were remanded from last week. There will also be the usual drunk cases, four of them at least.

Bonds of the new issue will be sent to the banks for delivery immediately after the receipt of the surrendered bonds.

The bonds of the maturing issue which are not converted under this proposal will be paid off in cash on the 1st December, 1922.
