FALLS CINCLES SECOND SECTION CHAMPIONSHIP

Playing two games within three days both against Cochrane in the Junction town, the Iroquois Falls Senior Baseball Team won the championship of the second half of the N.O.B. A., after practically an uphill battle all the way.

On Tuesday the 29th Aug. the Falls won the replay of the postponed game of July 31st by a score of 13—2. On Thursday, August 31st they cinched the championship by winning 8—4.

Both games resulted in victories due to beautiful pitching by Elliot Little, heavy batting in both games, and good all-round team work. Thacker and Campbell, who pitched for Cochrane, were treated alike by the Falls batters, the former being hit for twelve safe blows in the first game and the latter was hit safely ten times in eight innings in the final game. In addition to this, three singles were made off Thacker in the ninth inning of the final game, so taking both games into consideration the Falls batters made in all twenty-five hits, for a total of twenty-one runs.

The first game was in the Falls' favor all the way. At no time did Cochrane even threaten the score until the eighth inning, when Little let up in an effort to save himself for the next game. Ellie allowed in all six hits in this game, all widely scattered, with the exception of the eighth inning when two cracks were turned into two runs. In this game Bartholemew, Anson, Coons, Becker, and Hagan, each got two hits off Thacker. In the ninth inning, Bartholemew robbed himself of another hit by not touching first base on a clean cut single to right field.

In the seventh inning of the game on Tuesday, Coons was injured sliding to home plate and in the ninth inning base umpire Worrell rendered a close decision on Don, Campbell at third base, after Bousquet had made a wonderful throw from deep center to Anson in an endeavor to cut him off. The play was almost as perfect as could be.

Little struck out fifteen batters, which indicates the calibre of twirling exhibited by him. Cochrane could not hit him at all in the pinches.

One of the features of this game was a terrific three-base hit off the bat of Hagan, who by dint of faster base running could easily have made a home run. The ball went clean to the left field fence before stopping. Both Coons and Bartholemew had two-base hits.

In the second game played Thursday, Little opposed "Slip" Campbell. It was Little's second game within three days, as mentioned above. Cochrane sent in Campbell as a fresh pitcher. This was just to the liking of the Falls players. They proceeded to bat him all over the lot. Hagan leading with three hits in four trips to the plate. Brydge also had three hits in six trips, while Coons and Gratton had two each. Gratton's playing from the sixth inning on was well worth witnessing. Gauthier by running from short on a close decision at first base and pushing. Umpire Worrell, drew down an expulsion from the game. Bousquet went to short and Gratton to center field. Here he played wonderful ball, getting two hits in three trips, two putouts and two assists, performing in clever style. In the seventh inning, Gratton doubled Allarie off first base on a beautiful peg and in the ninth inning he cut off Cavanagh at the plate on an equally beautiful throw in.

The game was keenly contested and up to the ninth inning it was anybody's contest. In their half of the last inning, the Falls got three runs and cinched the game right there. Cochrane were only able to secure four singles off Little, and the Falls pounded both Campbell and Thacker hard.

The Falls scored two runs in their half of the first inning on two hits, a walk, stolen base and an error by Morrison. Cochrane came right back and scored three runs in their half of the same inning on two hits, two errors, a sacrifice and three stolen bases. In this inning Little retired the side by three strikeouts. No further scoring resulted until the Falls half of the fourth, when they managed to push across two more counters on four walks, two hits and one stolen base.

The Falls secured one more in the sixth inning, when Gratton in his first turn at bat, singled cleanly and reached second base on an error by George Campbell. Bartholemew flied out but Brydge scored him with another single. The Falls had men left on bases in every inning, to the total extent of fourteen men. In the fourth inning when Campbell walked four men, the bases were filled twice and even at that only two runs were scored. However, three men were left on base in this instance.

The crowd tried hard in the sixth inning to rattle Little by yelling at him, but Ellie only smiled and twirled

even better ball than previously.

A regrettable accident happened during the progress of the game when a foul tip crashed through the back stop netting and through the wind shield of an automobile parked directly behind the back stop. The ball struck Mrs. Bud Tickner in the mouth breaking two teeth and glass from the broken wind shield inflicting minor cuts on her face. Mrs. Tickner had her injuries attended to and came back to witness the finish of the game.

The Falls will now play off with the winners of the first half, and this will be determined next week when Timmins and Cochrane will meet. In the event of Timmins defeating Cochrane in the replay of one of their games, it will create a tie for the first half honours, and necessitate another game between these teams. In any event, the Falls can now rest on their laurels and are assured a chance at the championship by defeating whichever team wins the first half.
