PUBLICITY BUREAU FOR NORTH LAND PROPOSED

One of the probable recommendations to be made by the Legislature Committee touring the North Land relative to hotel accommodation and tourist traffic is that a branch bureau of publicity be established for the North Land. This branch bureau would see that the facts are made known regarding the resources and possibilities of the North Land, and its beauties and hunting and fishing spots. The idea, of course, is a good one, but is somewhat marred by the statement credited to the chairman of the Committee that "of course, North Bay was the logical location for the headquarters of such a publicity bureau." North Bay does not appear to be anything of the sort; in fact, the Bay appears to be a poor bet in this connection. North Bay is a typical Old Ontario town and appears to have little of the "booster" spirit even for itself. Any publicity bureau at North Bay would appear to be in a discouraging climate. If a publicity bureau is to be established it should be further North where the Northern spirit of faith and enterprise are more generally evident. So as to escape any suggestion of localism in the matter, The Advance would point to Iroquois Falls as an evidence of the "boosting" spirit and the attitude that makes for the progress of the North. Cochrane is another town that shows far more of the Northern spirit of advancement, enterprise and courage in the future than North Bay or any other Old Ontario community. If the real spirit of the North is to be given an opportunity to express itself the proposed publicity bureau will have to come north of North Bay to the progressive part of the North where there is abiding faith and hope in the North because the North is known.

LAKE SHORE AVERAGED \$26 PER TON DURING JULY

The official figures for the Lake Shore Mine at Kirkland Lake show that during July the production was 2,098 tons of an average grade of \$26.25, the total production being \$55,080.80. The mill operated 94.96 of possible time. It is understood that the construction of a larger mill has been definitely decided upon. In the course of the next 12 or 15 months it is likely that the Lake Shore will be equipped to handle 300 tons a day at the mill, with a probable production around \$160,000.00 per month, or approximately two million dollars per year.

DAVIDSON MINE SAID TO BE ASSURED OF \$900,000

It is understood that final arrangements have been made whereby \$900,000.00 is assured for the development of the Davidson Porcupine Gold Mines and the placing of the property on a producing basis. Of the total amount involved in an agreement made with British interests, \$450,000 has already been paid into the treasury; \$50,000.00 more will be paid in on Sept. 25th. and \$235,000 on Oct. 31st. while the balance will be available on the call of the directors on ten days' notice. Work at the property recently has been confined to diamond drilling chiefly. With the financing now amply and fully guaranteed, it is understood that the sinking of a three compartment shaft will be commenced as soon as arrangements for power are completed. Extensive plans of development will also be followed, and there is every reason for the belief that the Davidson will now have the best-possible opportunity to develop into a paying producing property. Much work has been done on the Davidson, all of it with very encouraging results.

HORSE, COW AND HEALTH CASES AT POLICE COURT

Acting Chief J. O'Connor did a good piece of work last week in the way of impressing upon all and sundry the necessity for keeping horses and cattle from straying on the streets. At Thursday's court A. Champagne was fined \$5.00 and costs for allowing his horses to be at large contrary to the by-law, while Fred Pagie, Shankman Bros., and S. Shub each paid a similar fine with costs because their cows were at large on the streets illegally. There were also a couple of ordinary cases, each paying the usual ten and costs, and a man charged with having a bottle in a public place was fined \$200.00 and costs.

Officer E. A. Roy had four men before the court for breach of the health laws. Each of the four was fined \$5.00 and costs.

Mr. Leo Mascioli, like other contractors in the district, has recently been finding difficulty in securing sufficient men for his various works. He found a way out of his difficulty, however. Last week he brought in a force of workers from Montreal. The men were Russians and there were forty in the party, all of them having to be cared for and watched until they could be placed at the work for which they were engaged.

THE MINISTER OF FINANCE offers to holders of these bonds who desire to continue their investment in Dominion of Canada securities the privilege of exchanging the maturing bonds for new bonds bearing 5½ per cent interest, payable half yearly, of either of the following classes:—

- (a) Five year bonds, dated 1st November, 1922, to mature 1st November, 1927.
- (b) Ten year bonds, dated 1st November, 1922, to mature 1st November, 1932.

While the maturing bonds will carry interest to 1st December, 1922, the new bonds will commence to earn interest from 1st November, 1922, GIVING A BONUS OF A FULL MONTH'S INTEREST TO THOSE AVAILING THEMSELVES OF THE CONVERSION PRIVILEGE.

This offer is made to holders of the maturing bonds and is not open to other investors. The bonds to be issued under this proposal will be substantially of the same character as those which are maturing, except that the exemption from taxation does not apply to the new issue.

Holders of the maturing bonds who wish to avail themselves of this conversion privilege should take their bonds AS EARLY AS POSSIBLE, BUT NOT LATER THAN SEPTEMBER 30th, to a Branch of any Chartered Bank in Canada and receive in exchange an official receipt for the bonds surrendered, containing an undertaking to deliver the corresponding bonds of the new issue.

Holders of maturing fully registered bonds, interest payable by cheque from Ottawa, will receive their December 1 interest cheque as usual. Holders of coupon bonds will detach and retain the last unmatured coupon before surrendering the bond itself for conversion purposes.

The surrendered bonds will be forwarded by banks to the Minister of Finance at Ottawa, where they will be exchanged for bonds of the new issue, in fully registered, or coupon registered or coupon bearer form carrying interest payable 1st May and 1st November of each year of the duration of the loan, the first interest payment accruing and payable 1st May, 1923. Bonds of the new issue will be sent to the banks for delivery immediately after the receipt of the surrendered bonds.

The bonds of the maturing issue which are not converted under this proposal will be paid off in cash on the 1st December, 1922.
