## Timmins and District Notes

The next big event for this district will be the Porcupine Fair at Golden City on Sept. 28th.

The next regular meeting of the Town Council is scheduled for Monday afternoon next, Sept. 11th, at 4 p.m.

Mr. Jos. Jacobs left on Thursday for a two weeks' vacation in Toronto, Buffalo, New York and other points in the south.

Miss E. Forbes, of Caledonia, Ont., who has been visiting her brother, Mr. J. M. Forbes, left on Sunday for her home after a pleasant holiday in this Camp.

Teek Township is understood to be making arrangements to supply residents with coal at \$17.00 per ton. One car has been secured and other cars expected to be secured.

At the Golf Course last week a match between the Hollinger and the Town had been planned, but the rain made it necessary to postpone the event.

Mr. C. W. Knight, Assistant Geologist of the Ontario Dept. of Mines, is in the Lightning River area on which he will make a report. It is expected that a road-building programme will follow the report.

A gentleman with a penchant for statistics has figured out that there are no less than 43 diamond drilling machines in active operation at present in the Porcupine Camp and that every day, day in and day out, 487 feet of diamond drilling is the record. This work is figured to cost around half a million dollars a year.

New Liskeard Fair on Thursday, Friday and Saturday, Sept. 14, 15 and 16, promises to be unusually successful. Not only is the Fair enlarged and improved this year, but there is a consistent attempt to reach out to a wider circle of patronage, as evidenced by the fact that a more extensive advertising campaign has been carried out this year to reach points in the North some distance from Liskeard.

The annual meeting of the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Associated Boards of Trade is scheduled for Sept. 14th, 15th and 16th, at New Liskeard Fair so the Creamery Town should have the cream of the stock, produce and citizenship of the North Land on Sept. 14-16.

There has been a wonderful crop, or series of crops, of blueberries in this district this year, the berries being available practically all the summer. Raspberries have not been so good a crop. It appears that when the raspberries are a good crop the blueberries are not so good and vice versa, or topsy-turvey, as Charlie would say.

Operations have commenced at the new mill of the Temiskaming Pulp & Paper Co., recently erected at a cost of approximately a million dollars. Data from Haileybury is to the effect that the new mill will have a daily production of forty tons of ground wood pulp, which will be shipped Chicago, Kalamazoo and points in the State of New York.

It is rumored that Mr. Albert Griggs formerly Deputy Minister of Lands, Forests and Mines, will be a candidate for the Legislature at next election in Algoma. With what Mr. Griggs knows about the treatment received by the North Land generally from Legislatures and Government, and with his inside knowledge of the Department, he should make a very interesting candidate.
