THREE NEW MINES LISTED ON EXCHANGE LAST WEEK

Consolidated West Dome, Davidson Consolidated and Herrick Now On List.

Three new securities were listed last week on the Standard Mining Exchange,—the Consolidated West Dome Lake Mines, the Davidson Consolidated and the Herrick Gold Mines.

The Consolidated West Domes Lake Mines, as its name implies, is an amalgamation of the West Dome and the Dome Lake, and has a capital of \$500,000, with a par value of \$1. The mine office is at South Porcupine and the transfer agents are the Securities Transfer and Registration Company. The property, which immediately adjoins the Dome Mines on the west and south-west, consists of nine claims and contains five shafts, all of which have reached the 600-foot level, and one of which has been sunk to a depth of 630 feet. It is the immediate intention of the management to sink the main shaft to the 1,050-foot level. The company has the usual mining equipment and a mill.

Davidson Consolidated shares will be called for the first time this week. Arrangements for the financing of the company's property to place it on a producing basis were completed recently and were entirely successful.

The sum of \$900,000 has been assured by the British interests, half of which has already been paid into the treasury, part of the remainder to be paid at stated periods this year and the residue on call of the directors on ten days' notice. Immediately electric power is available at the mine, a three compartment shaft will be sunk, 1,000 feet and a 500-ton mill erected. The mine has \$3,500,000 proven ore above the 600-foot level, averaging \$11 to the ton, and diamond drills have indicated the extension of the large ore bodies opened up at upper levels. Indicated average values between the 800 and 1,300-ft. levels are materially higher than at upper levels. A diamond drill has been started which will penetrate to vertical depth of 2,000 feet. The most important recent development was the location at the 800 ft. level of a basic porphyry contact which will be further explored by the diamond drill being sunk now.

The Herrick property is in the West Shiningtree area. It is likely it will be listed on the New York Exchange as well as at Toronto. The Company,

which is capitalized at \$2,000,000, is under working option to the Tonopah Mining Company, which has large assets and is in a position to carry forward vigorous development to prove up the property. The Tonopah engineer is in charge at the mine and the sinking of a two-compartment shaft has already been started. The Herrick Company had completed a thorough diamond drilling campaign which indicated the extension at depth of well defined surface ore bodies of good commercial value and a two-compartment shaft had been sunk to a depth of 100 feet. The Tonopah Company has undertaken to sink the shaft to the 400-ft. level and do 2,000 feet of lateral work, which, in view of the knowledge gained by diamond drilling should serve to prove up the property. A report from the engineer this week stated that shaft sinking was progressing favorably.

Sainsbury, who has been interested for years in prospecting and mining in the north, and Mrs. Patterson is the wife of the President of the Canadian Gold Mining Syndicate, the corporation now developing Lightning River properties. The ladies are going to do real prospecting it is understood. At any rate they were dressed for the part, being garbed in riding breeches and khaki shirts. Both Cobalt and Porcupine camps had lady prospectors in the early days. A lady prospector also created some notice in the Kirkland area some time ago. The lady prospectors in the Porcupine Camp were of the practical variety, and more than one of them actually staked out valuable properties. Mrs. Flowers was probably the best-known lady prospector in this district and she staked a number of

claims that have much promise. Mrs. Flowers has passed to the other Land of Gold, but a number of the claims she staked are being held by the estate as very valuable properties. A couple of these claims are alongside the Mattagami River near Timmins and are considered as very promising.
