Rev. J. D. Parks returned last week from his vacation in the south.

Mr. and Mrs. Ernest King returned last week from their wedding tour in the south, and have taken up residence on Spruce street.

Chief of Police M. Greer and family returned home last week after a holiday spent in the Ottawa district and other points south and east.

On Friday and Saturday of this week, Sept. 15th and 16th, a roll of "Life Savers" will be given free to all attending the show at the New Empire Theatre.

"Absolutely nothing to it," said Rev. Fr. Martindale to the Northern News when asked regarding a recent report that there would be a Separate School built in Kirkland Lake in the near future.

Mr. A. A. Cole, Mining Engineer for the T. & N. O., left last week for a trip to James Bay. He will make the journey from the railway to the Bay by means of the airship in use in the North all this summer.

Mr. F. Horn, of the Horn, Weintraub Co., left last week for the West, the office here being closed. While in Timmins the firm specialized in the sale of stock in the National Life Preserver Co., a company making a unique style of suit for use in ocean travel. The stock had a successful sale here.

In the Holstein class, at the Toronto Exhibition last week, a 2-year-old bull from Mr. A. J. Kennedy's Glangary Farm near New Liskeard won third prize, and a 3-year-old cow, Lady Maud, took sixth in a strong class.

Bill Speck, of Haileybury has signed on with the Calgary professional hockey team and is leaving for the west. This takes from Haileybury one of the team's best players. Oscar Cox, formerly of Timmins, is also with the Calgary team this year, so Calgary is looking forward to some great old hockey.

Last week one of the most horrible crimes ever perpetrated in the North Land was committed when a little girl under five years of age was criminally assaulted at her home in Cobalt during the temporary absence of her mother, the hideous crime being committed by a man whose identity is yet unknown.

Swastika hopes to have electric light and power this winter. The Power Co. has been interviewed and is understood to have given a favourable answer to the request for the extension of the line to take in Swastika. It is expected that construction work will start at a very early date.

As judges of the entries in the parade on Labour Day here, Messrs. P. A. Macaulay, Hugh Richardson and J. W. Faithful made a record. Usually in such cases someone has some criticism to make over the decisions of the judges. In this case there was not a question as to the absolute correctness of the placing by the judges in each and all of the classes for which prizes were awarded.

"If the business men of the South had seen the wonderful collection of beautiful flowers and fine vegetables at that Horticultural Show last week, they would have had a striking illustration of what this country can do in this line," he says. The Horticultural Show was a revelation even to old-time residents here, and to the visitors it would certainly have impressed a new viewpoint on what has sometimes been termed even by those in high places as "this bleak and barren North."

Cobalt is purchasing three "silent policemen" for use on the streets of the Silver Town. In earlier days it is said that policemen have been purchased in Cobalt but they were not of the silent variety.

It is estimated that the fire which destroyed the big mining and reduction plant of the O'Brien Mine at Cobalt last week, caused a loss of approximately a quarter of a million dollars.

At 5.45 Sunday afternoon the Fire Brigade had a call to the town annex where the new Hollinger houses are in course of erection. The fire was in some piles of tar paper and was discovered by the watchmen kept on the works by the Foundation Company who have the contract for the new houses. There was a great amount of smoke but the fire was not a dangerous one and was soon put out by use of water buckets. The cause of the fire is not known. There was no damage done except some slight loss through the injury to the tar paper rolls. The brigade as usual made a very speedy response to the call.

The Porecupine Mutual, adjacent to the Hollinger Reserve, is planning several thousand feet of diamond drilling.

A noteworthy find of free gold in a promising formation was reported last week from Deloro Township from claims near the Big Dyke.

Beginning on Sunday next, Sept. 17th, Sunday School at the Presbyterian church will be held at 2.30 p.m. for the winter months.

Mr. J. A. Broughton, of Monteith, is erecting a large greenhouse and intends to grow plants for the North Land. He counts on growing all sorts of perennial flowers and vegetable plants such as tomatoes, cabbage, cauliflower, etc. With a small greenhouse he has had much success, and has developed a number of strains particularly suitable and fully acclimatized for the North Land.

Small cash prizes were distributed last week by Mr. H. Hatton, barber, King's Amusement Parlors, in connection with the Horticultural Show held under the auspices of the Timmins Football Club on the big day of sports and pleasure, Sept. 4th. Mr. Hatton had charge of this feature of the Labour Day event, and the Horticultural Show feature proved so successful and pleasing that it is likely that it will not only be made a permanent annual feature but also that its scope will be much enlarged.

"A Flying Cabinet Minister," is the heading on an editorial article in the last issue of The Cochrane Post. At first, The Advance thought it must refer to Hon.
