ADVISE INVESTMENT OF TEN MILLIONS ANNUALLY

Suggestion to Ontario Government re
North Land, From Board of
Trade Visitors.

From statements made by Mr. R. A. Stapells, who was in charge of the party of business men who toured the North Land last week under the auspices of the Toronto Board of Trade, a recommendation is to be made to Premier Drury by the Toronto Board of Trade to the effect that the Ontario Government make an allotment of ten million dollars a year for at least five years to be spent in the North Land. The recommendation, according to Mr. Stapells, will be accompanied by the advice that the money be placed in the hands of the people of Northern Ontario, to do with it as they consider wise, and he considered should be under the jurisdiction of some representative or governing body that will direct its expenditure into the most needed channels. Should such a recommendation be carried out it will increase the amount of government expenditure annually from about \$5,500,000, claimed by Premier Drury, to almost double this amount, with the additional advantages of having it expended according to the best judgment of a representative body of Northern Ontario men. Mr. Stapells stated that he himself believed that \$10,000,000 limit should be expended annually and he considered that the government could make no better investment. As to who should have the administration of such a fund, he was unprepared to say. It could be placed

BUS SERVICE TO CONTINUE THROUGH THE WINTER

The "big grey busses" (the Timmins-Porcupine Bus Service) are being equipped with heaters and otherwise prepared for service as usual during the winter. It is the intention to keep the big grey busses on their usual route through the winter, thus making the service an all-the-year-round one. It is understood that the Township of Tisdale and others concerned have agreed to co-operate in the keeping open of the road, and it is thus likely that the service will be able to continue daily all winter with the possible exception of an odd day now and again when snow or other troubles prevent. If the present plans work out the service is likely to be just as steady and reliable as the railway service in winter.
