**INTER-SCHOOL LEAGUE  
MEET HERE ON SATURDAY**

Third of Attractive Athletic Meets  
Between School Teams of Dis-  
trict Towns.

On Saturday of this week, Oct. 7th. Iroquois Falls and Monteith will play Timmins in the baseball series in the Inter-School Athletic League of the three schools. On Saturday, Sept. 23rd. at Monteith, Monteith defeated both Timmins and the Falls school teams. Last Saturday at the meet at the Falls Timmins and Monteith each defeated the Falls, the score in the first match being 2 to 1, and in the last-named 13 to 0. Speaking of the games The Broke Hustler this week says:

The second pair of games in this league was played at Iroquois Falls, Sept. 30. The morning game between Timmins and Iroquois Falls was a splendid exhibition of baseball, Timmins winning by 2-1.

The Falls obtained their solitary run in the first innings after which Neil only allowed the home team three safe hits. Tessier pitched good ball for the Falls, Timmins getting only three safe hits in the whole game. He walked three Timmins boys and in the fourth his gift to Lawrence led to the overthrow of the locals. The same fourth innings tells the story of the game. Lawrence, first man up walked, Studor hit safe while the next two up, Neill and Levine, were retired. Then Kari swatted the ball for two bases and Lawrence and Studor romped home. The next man up was an easy out, but the beans had been spilled. In all the other innings, Timmins had but three men up each time except in the fifth when four men faced the pitcher.

In the afternoon game, Monteith slaughtered the innocent homebrews by a 13-0 score with the game called in the sixth innings on account of the coming storm. Gauthier went in to pitch for the home team but Monteith liked his offerings, gathering three runs in the first innings and eight in the second. He retired at the end of the third and Ted Hennessy pitched good ball for the balance of the game, the visitors getting only two more runs. The loss of the first baseman who was not able to be present and the wholesale changing around of the position of the players seemed to put the boys off their usual good game, for wild throws and all kinds of errors in the field marred what should have been the best game of the season. Axcell pitched a good game for Monteith and was well supported in the field. Although the locals got a total of nine safe hits the Falls seemed unable to score.

The visitors expressed themselves as much impressed with the wonderful growth and progress of the North Land, especially in regard to Timmins. They visited the producing mines here and also had a look at the "mines-in-the-making" and the town and district in general. **MR. R. F. ARGLES SUDDENLY  
STRICKEN FRIDAY NIGHT**

Mr. R. F. Argles, chartered accountant and public auditor, was found dead on the side of his bed in his room adjoining his office in the Reed block on Saturday morning. The sad discovery was made by his assistant, Mr. Frank Carnow, on entering the office for business on Saturday morning. Dr. Taylor was summoned at once, but life had been extinct for several hours. It is thought that Mr. Argles passed away while undressing to retire for the night. Apparently he had sat down on the bed after taking off his coat and vest and lighting a cigarette. An attack of acute indigestion had evidently induced heart trouble and sudden death resulted. The front of the dead man's shirt was burned where the lighted cigarette had fallen upon it. For a day or so Mr. Argles had been troubled with indigestion. Friday evening he had gone to choir practice, but feeling ill had left before the practice was over. He had consulted a doctor during the evening and then retired to his room feeling much better.

The late Reginald F. Argles was born in England, but for a number of years was a resident of Toronto. He came to the North Land several years ago as accountant for Mr. J. R. Gordon, holding the position until Mr. Gordon sold out the business to the Hollinger Stores. Mr. Argles continued for a time with the Hollinger Stores as accountant, later setting up for himself as a public auditor and chartered accountant, and by "experience, energy, efficiency and equipment," as he phrased it himself, building up a large clientele. For many years he was a member of the Queen's Own Regiment Band in Toronto, and he always took a keen interest in musical matters. For several years he has been a valued member of St. Matthew's Anglican church choir. He had been church secretary at St. Matthew's for some time past and gave much time and thought to church progress. He was well known in the town and district and will be much missed in many circles. At the time of his death the late Mr. Argles was about 58 years of age. There is very general regret at his sudden passing away. He had no near kin in this part of the country, but the remains were shipped on Sunday for interment.

**TWO-IN-ONE GOLD MINES  
STARTS SINKING MONDAY**

Mr. W. Cochrane, of New York, President of the Two-in-One Gold Mines, has been in the Camp in connection with the starting of active development work on the property. The Two-in-One Gold Mines is controlled by New York interests and is now ready financially and otherwise for a progressive development policy. The plan is to thoroughly prove up the holdings. Sinking commences on Monday, the necessary contracts having been let and other arrangements made. Among the holdings are the United Porcupine claims representing the first mining interests in the Camp.

**FURTHER DEVELOPMENTS  
IN HIGH-GRADING CASE**

Among the developments last week in the high-grading case which apparently is centering around gold taken from Kirkland Lake Gold Mines was the statement that about \$20,000 worth of gold had been taken from the property illegally during the past year or two. Five men are under arrest in the case, one of them, John T. Shaw, having been committed to the asylum as being a sufferer from mental trouble. Some of those arrested are understood to have made full confessions to the police, revealing a complicated plan for the carrying on of the gold thefts. Carl Bestwick, one of those under arrest, is understood to have made restitution to the full extent of his resources, some \$13,000.00 in all, chiefly in stock. Preliminary trials of the men will be given this week at Toronto and Haileybury.

**PERMANENT QUARTERS  
FOR BANK OF MONTREAL**

The Bank of Montreal has purchased the lot alongside the post office, now occupied by Mr. L. Halperin's jewelry store, from Mrs. H. Peters, and it is understood that work will be under way very shortly in the erection of a fine new bank building there as permanent quarters for the Timmins branch of the Bank of Montreal. With this announcement there should be a movement to change the name of the street to Bank Street, as very shortly all the banks in town will have fine bank buildings on this one street, all within a block of each other. For years the block in which the Bank of Commerce is situated was the finest business structure in town, though recently the number of fine new brick business blocks has taken away this distinction. The fine premises of the Imperial Bank have also been a creditable section of the business part of the town. The Dominion Bank some months ago purchased the property opposite the post office on Pine street and have plans out for an imposing bank building. It is understood that work on the new Dominion Bank building will be started in the course of the next few weeks and rushed to completion.
