**PORC. MUTUAL SYNDICATE  
MAY MERGE WITH McENANEY**

The Porcupine Mutual Gold Mines Syndicate of which Mr. Jules St. Paul is the manager and Mr. J. C. Boyd the secretary, has received an offer to merge their claims with the property of the McEnaney Gold Mines adjoining. The plan is to develop the combined property as a united holding. The members of the Syndicate, under this plan, would receive back all the money subscribed to date and in addition 200 shares of the stock of the McEnaney Gold Mines. The McEnaney Gold Mines is capitalized at four million dollars, two million remaining in the treasury. The plan of the merger is favourably considered and a meeting has been called at North Bay for Monday next, Oct. 9th, to decide the matter. A majority of the members of the Syndicate reside at North Bay and this centre has accordingly been chosen for the meeting. Good results have followed the exploration work on the Syndicate's property and the McEnaney Gold Mines holdings (including what was formerly known as the Hollinger Reserve) are also very promising claims. The merged property should form a valuable holding and well worth of the most thorough proving-up.

**YOUNG LADY ATTACKED  
BY RUFFIAN WITH CLUB**

Tuesday evening last week a young lady rushed into a house near the corner of Cedar street and Sixth Avenue, explaining to the lady of the house that she was seeking refuge from a man with a club who had attacked her while on her way home. The young lady was bleeding profusely from a cut on the head and was suffering from blows and fright. The man had come upon her suddenly and struck her without a word of excuse or explanation. She had screamed and fled, the man chasing her for some distance until she took refuge in the nearest house where she noticed a light. Medical assistance was at once secured and the police at once notified. The doctor attended to the injuries which fortunately were not serious and the young woman was able to be taken home and is now practically recovered from the blows received. The police made a prompt and exhaustive search and inquiry but have been handicapped by the fact that no very clear description of the man making the assault is available. The young woman no doubt was naturally fully occupied with making her escape and so can give little useful description of her assailant further than that he was a stranger. The police have found the club used, this being a hard-wood axe-handle. It is believed that the man was a foreigner and that he attacked the young woman believing her to be some one else.
