GOOD ORE LOCATED ON SMITH VET. CLAIM OF DAVIDSON

Further good news was received last week from Davidson Consolidated Gold Mines. On the Smith Veteran claims of the property, half a mile from the main workings, a diamond drill hole penetrated two ore bodies—one at the 440-foot level, indicating 20 feet width, and one at the 658-foot level, indicating 35 feet. Both ore bodies assayed commercial grade. The sections were well schisted, the latter, at 658 feet depth, being typical of the Davidson ore at the main workings.

Lieut.-Col. R. C. Fielding, consulting engineer of the Porcupine Davidson Company, is leaving London for Canada for the purpose of conferring with the general manager of the mine regarding development plans. The plans include the sinking of a main working shaft and the construction of a mill.

It is understood that Davidson Consolidated shareholders will receive something by way of a distribution shortly, the proceeds of the sale of some additional treasury stock. The Davidson Consolidated has a large share interest in the Porcupine Davidson Company, which interest should increase in value as developments at the property proceed.

MURRAY-MOGRIDGE AND BOURKES MINES MAY RE-OPEN

Reports recently reaching Northern Ontario intimate that both the Murray-Mogridge and Bourkes Mines properties are to resume, if negotiations under way are successful. The Murray-Mogridge deekings have been with English capital, and Bourkes Mines has been attempting to raise more finances from Toronto and Pennsylvania interests already in control of the company.

A meeting of Murray-Mogridge Mines, the original company, is being held with the view to shareholders ratifying a proposal of the directors to reduce the old company's holdings in the new company to the extent of about 25 per cent. The additional stock which would be left in the new company's treasury would be for the purpose, The Miner is informed, of facilitating a deal with the English interests. It is confidently expected that if the original company's shareholders agree to the reduction of their holdings in the new company that the necessary finances would be secured almost immediately to pay off present liabilities and re-open the property.

When the Murray-Mogridge starts it is likely that the shaft, now down 200 feet and from which work totalling about six hundred feet has been done on the 100 and 200 foot levels, though sufficient was done at the 400 foot level to demonstrate the downward continuation of the ore. When financed Bourkes Mines will probably continue the development of the 400 foot level, and possibly do further work on the upper levels.

There are several prospectors at work in the district around Bourkes. Fires have facilitated their work.

The Havit gold mine about fifteen miles north of Bruce Mines, has reopened after being closed down for twenty years. Wasn't it Jonah who said, "You can't keep a gold mine down?"

TO BE NO CASH GRANT FROM THE ONTARIO GOVERNMENT

A despatch from Cobalt last week says:—"I hardly think it will be necessary for the Province to give a cash grant to the relief fund," said Premier Drury to the Canadian Press here to-night. "We are giving all the clothing and food, also lumber for temporary shacks which will have to be built right away on account of cold weather. If more cash is needed I am sure it can be raised voluntarily," he added.

CONGRATULATES TIMMINS ON JACK MARSHALL AS COACH

For many years Mr. Alex Dewar, editor of The Broke Hustler, at Iroquois Falls, has known Mr. Jack Marshall, Timmins new hockey coach. In the current issue of The Broke Hustler, Mr. Dewar gives his opinion of Mr. Marshall as follows, and it should make interesting reading to all hockey fans here:—

Jack Marshall, of Montreal, has been engaged by Timmins as hockey coach. Jack first appeared on the hockey horizon with the old Victoria team of Winnipeg and then with the Montreal team. He was playing the same time as Billy Nicholson, Tom Phillips, Charlie Liffiton, Dickey Boon of the Montreals; Russell Bowie and Blair Russell of the Victorias. Jack had speed and used it for sixty minutes, for there was no subbing in those early days.

Then came the Wanderers and their brilliant career with Jack as one of them.

Jack first broke into the coaching game by piloting the Toronto pros to victory.

In 1901 he played on the Winnipeg Victoria team which took the Stanley Cup from Shamrocks. In 1902 he played with Montreal, "The Little Men of Iron" who took the cup from Winnipeg.

Jack is known in the north as he played pro in 1910 when Cobalt and Haileybury were in the league.

In 1913, 14 and 15 he managed and coached the Toronto pros, winning the cup in 1914.

He later coached the M.A.A.A. teams and the Royal Bank team.

Timmins is to be congratulated on getting him. He knows hockey, is a good fellow, and gives everything he has.

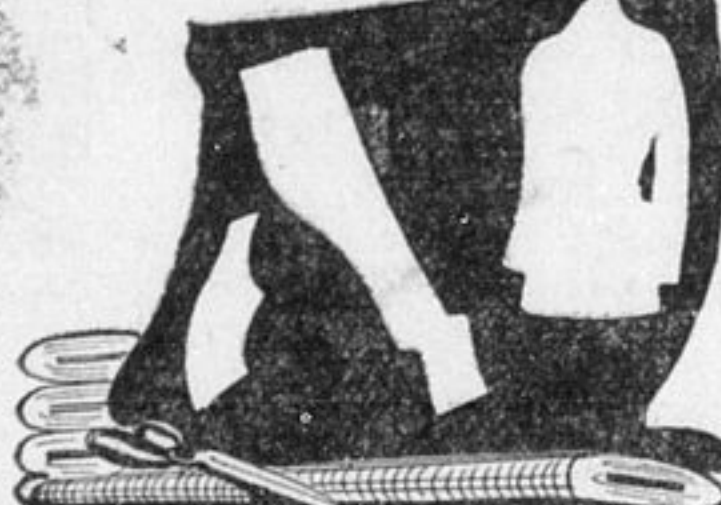
