The production of gold amounts to 585,833 fine ounces, valued at \$12,110,242, as against 396,391 fine ounces, valued at \$8,194,129, for the first half of 1921. It is estimated that these mines produced during last August gold to the value of nearly \$1,840,000.

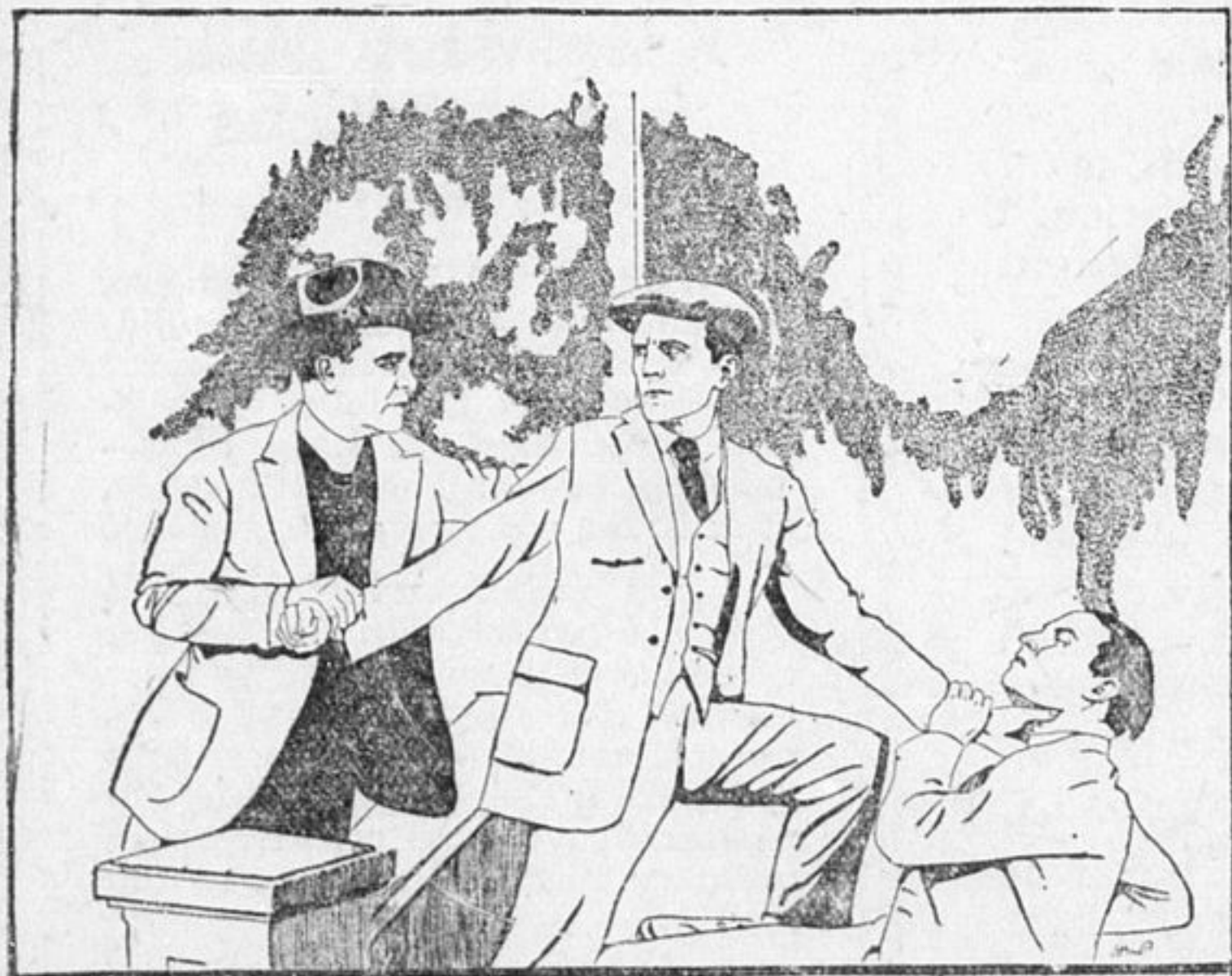
