**RADIO SUPPLY STORE TO BE OPENED IN TIMMINS**

Up-to-the-Minute Business Will be Supervised by Pioneer Wireless Expert, Mr. M. J. Caveney.

Owing to the insistent demand for radiophone receiving sets in Timmins and surrounding territory Mr. T. F. King has decided to open an up-to-date radio supply store.

The store will be located in Mr. King's premises adjoining the Amusement Parlors, and the services of the well-known amateur, Mr. M. J. Caveney, of Sandy Falls, have been secured to supervise the business.

A complete stock of standard parts for radio sets will be carried, in addition to several samples of complete radiophone receivers ready for use.

A high-power amplifier for radiophone music will be used for demonstrating these sets, and also to furnish the patrons of the Dance Hall with first-class musical programmes from many distant cities.

An up-to-date stock of parts for small amateur sets will also be on hand, together with information as to assembly and operation. In addition, arrangements have been made for broadcasting code messages each evening from the store for the benefit of those budding amateurs who wish to learn the telegraph code which is used by all the wireless stations of the world. These messages will be sent very slowly and prizes are to be offered each week to those amateurs showing the greatest proficiency in reception.

Many of the citizens of Timmins who listened last week to the wireless demonstration at King's found themselves at a loss for adequate expression. The expression most used was the word, "Wonderful!" and to the ordinary layman it certainly appeared so. All that was necessary in order to listen to the musical programme of a score of distant cities, some of which were over a thousand miles away, was to turn a button. Songs and instrumental music from such cities as St. Louis, Kansas City, Atlanta, Georgia, Indianapolis, Buffalo, Schenectady, Springfield, Pittsburg, etc., were on top all evening. Any person could go to any city he wished by slightly turning one single knob on the instrument. As one man said, it was pretty near uncanny. With the radio now in full service a visit to King's Amusement Parlors is well worth while these evenings.

In the meantime with the radiophone supply store as the latest addition to the enterprises of Timmins, it looks as if the old-time saying would soon need to be revised to read:—"New York gets more like Timmins every day."

**NEW LISKEARD SPEAKER SHOWS THE RIGHT SPIRIT**

Last week there was a rumor current to the effect that prominent men from New Liskeard had driven through the fire and smoke-swept area to Cobalt, even before the fire had done its worst, to endeavor to bring pressure on the Government to have the new county buildings erected in Liskeard and that town made the county seat. This was not a pleasant rumor to believe, and the general feeling was that the story was only one of those foolish and evil things that start nowhere and are founded on nothing of real fact. The attitude of the people of New Liskeard to the fire sufferers seemed to disprove any such rumor by indicating that the folks of the Creamery Town were so busy helping the sufferers and showing them kindly sympathy that for the moment they had no time or heart for self-interest. No one will believe other than that thought and sympathy and consideration for the fire-sufferers were the all-important interests to the good people of New Liskeard at the time of the tragedy that visited the neighboring town of Haileybury. The Advance believes that the New Liskeard Speaker is representative of the general opinions of the people of New Liskeard. And The Speaker takes the attitude that would be expected of that good newspaper. In the last issue of The Speaker the following paragraph appears on the front page:—

"The citizens of Haileybury are busily engaged arranging for the rebuilding of their town. An appeal has been made to the Roman Catholic Bishop to rebuild the cathedral and hospital, while a number of business men have signed a document pledging each other to re-build homes and places of business. In their efforts we assure them they have the best wishes of The Speaker, and if we can be of the least assistance as a medium for giving information we shall be pleased to render such assistance. We are extremely sorry for Mr. Leishman, the publisher of The Haileyburian, and have offered to help him out in almost any way he suggests. The Speaker wants nothing from Haileybury which the town had before the fire, but we wish to help in any way possible."

**ANOTHER OF THE HEROES SAVED FAMILY OF TWELVE**

Jack Aistops, a Government employee at Hilliardton, is another of the heroes of the fire. When the flames swept over the water's edge at places on the Haileybury beach he managed to save twelve in a family from what would otherwise have been sure death. He got them on a scow and poled them out of immediate danger, though he could not get them away from the fierce heat. By the use of water soaked blankets he kept injury away from his charges, but in the process his own clothes were practically burned off his back. He was slightly burned about the body but cheerfully went his way after the fire.
