**THE GREYHOUNDS SEEM TO
HAVE STARTED UP A "BIRD"**

Some days ago an article started to go the rounds of the press regarding the alleged objection of the Sault Greyhounds to have Iroquois Falls included in the one group for hockey in the North Land. This article, first printed in the Sault Ste. Marie News, roused a regular "bird" of a reply. Here are the two, the growlings of the Greyhounds, as published in the Sault News, and the "bird" of a reply, as sent to the editor of the same Sault News:—

The News item was as follows:—
"POOR TRAINING DIET."
"No matter how the local hockey executive views the proposed entry of Iroquois Falls into one big N.O.H.A. group, the individual members of the Greyhounds are up in arms against the Falls and Timmins in the league."

"The members of last year's Greyhounds do not hesitate a minute to balk on the long trip to the Falls, and their reason is well founded. With the awful nightmare of last year's debacle vivid before them, the players will tell you of the tedious train journey, in a train delayed for hours. Tired after a long trip the players were forced to put up with hotel accommodations anything but ideal. No milk was served at the meals and their main article of diet was salt pork. There were no conveniences to speak of in the hotel, and in several other ways the hostelry was much below what a hockey team demands. Good hockey under such conditions is impossible."

"The Soo players have never complained of their trip to the North till the present. They feel now, however, that they should voice their sentiments before the league is formed."

**MURDER CHARGE AGAINST
MAN IN IROQUOIS FALLS**

The following is from this week's issue of The Broke Hustler:—

Karol Kilimnik was charged with murder before Magistrate Atkinson, last Wednesday, and was sent on for trial at the next Assizes, which will be on the 5th of December.

The coroner's inquest adjourned from the week before, was concluded on Wednesday morning and the jury brought in a verdict that John Melnychuk had met death by a sharp instrument in the hands of a person unknown. Judge Atkinson criticized the jury's finding on the fact that the evidence had been very plain, that the axe was wielded by Kilimnik.

Immediately the coroner's inquest was over, F. L. Smiley, Crown Prosecutor, swore out a warrant against Kilimnik charging him with murder. The same evidence that was given at the coroner's inquest, was taken and Judge Atkinson ordered Kilimnik to be tried at the next Assizes.
