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**REVIEW OF PROGRESS AT
 No. 1 GROUP OF GOLDALE**

Plant in Good Condition. Equipment Added. Very Satisfactory Results from Work Done.

The following letter to shareholders of the Goldale Mines Limited from the President, Mr. James Y. Murdoch, reviews the progress of work at this company's property at the east end of Pearl Lake. This review is of special interest and places the case very conservatively:—

"I have just returned from a visit to Group No. 1 of your Company's properties situated at the Easterly end of Pearl Lake in Tisdale Township, Porcupine, which group is being developed by Kerr Lake Mining Company, Limited, under the efficient management of Mr. H. A. Kee.

"Since operations were commenced in March last the plant has been completely overhauled and considerable extra equipment added, such as new headframe and hoist, light generating system, additional boiler equipment, drilling machines, ore cars, et cetera. No. 3 Curzon shaft was sunk to the 130 foot level some years ago as a two compartment shaft and this shaft has been enlarged and sunk as a three compartment shaft from that level to approximately 550 feet. Stations were cut at the 350 foot and 500 foot levels and loading skip pocket and water sump were completed below the 500 foot level. Lateral work on the 500 foot level was commenced on the 25th September last, and on the 6th inst. the work accomplished was as follows:—260 feet advance, in No. 501 South cross cut, 123 feet advance, in No. 502 East drift, 123 feet advance, in No. 503 North cross cut off the East drift, and 12 feet advance, in No. 504 South cross cut off the East drift. This lateral work is proceeding at the rate of approximately 100 feet per week.

"In the sinking of the shaft a vein which was not indicated on the surface was encountered at approximately 200 feet which showed good milling ore and in the lateral work on the 500 foot level four schisted sections in granular basalt were encountered in No. 501 South cut, ranging in width from one foot to fourteen feet and carrying encouraging values. In No. 503 North cross cut off the East drift quartz and iron sulphides in gray basaltic schist were encountered and at a point approximately 150 feet North

from the East drift the lower extension of a quartz porphyry tongue was encountered and at a short distance beyond this point a five foot quartz vein in the porphyry carrying good values was encountered. The total width of the porphyry in this cross cut has not yet been determined but it is believed that this quartz porphyry is the lower extension of the porphyry encountered in the North cross cut on the 130 foot level and recently exposed by surface trenching. Work in No. 504 South cross cut off the East drift has exposed favourable mineralization in a faulted section in basaltic schist containing quartz which, apart from free gold encountered, assayed from \$4.00 to \$12.00 in gold.

"The purpose of driving the cross cuts mentioned has been to obtain geological information and the work of drifting to the East is now being proceeded with. This is for the purpose of exposing the lower extensions of the more favourable mineralized section indicated by the diamond drilling done East of the shaft in 1921, extending over a length of several hundred feet when good values were obtained in the drill cores.

**PROFESSIONAL COACHES MAY
 BE BARRED BY A.A.U. OF C.**

The delegates at the annual meeting of the Ontario Branch, A.A.U. of C., held recently, approved of considerable new legislation that was submitted by the Executive Committee. This is being sent on to the A.A.U. of C. for consideration at the annual meeting of that body to be held in Montreal, December 8 and 9 next, and is as follows:—

That the per capita tax on all registration cards issued by the branches of five cents each be reduced to two cents. At the present time it costs the branch on the average 15 cents for each card issued, and the A.A.U. of C. get the same amount as the branches, five cents each, as well as the branch annual affiliation fee of \$100. The delegates could not see where this arrangement is fair, and are asking for a reduction in the charge. The branches are doing all the work, assuming all the responsibility, and the A.A.U. of C. none.

In future it will be impossible for professionals and those not in good standing with the A.A.U. to hold office with any amateur organization. Legislation to this effect was endorsed. This has been the policy in the past,

although it was not covered by the constitution.

The maximum value of souvenirs to be given by any organization or accepted by any athlete must not exceed the sum of \$100, and must be of the nature defined by the A.A.U. of C. constitution, which provides for souvenirs or prizes which do not affect the cost of living of the recipient, and shall be subject to the approval of the Registration Committee.

Considerable discussion developed over the question of paid professional coaches. W. J. Smith, director of athletics of the branch, introduced a motion that all affiliated organizations promoting and governing team games be asked to consider the question of restricting the activities of paid professional coaches, and report to the union their views of the subject. It was pointed out that it is a growing practice of organizations in employing professional coaches, and the question was raised by Mr. Smith as to whether it was in the best interests of amateur sport, and expressed his opinion that it was becoming a menace and inimical to the principles of the games. The resolution was adopted by the delegates.

**TWO PER CENT. DIVIDEND OF
 LAKE SHORE PAYABLE TO-DAY**

A dividend of 2 per cent. on the issued capital stock of the Lake Shore Mines, Ltd., Kirkland Lake, has been declared, payable November 15th, to shareholders of record of November 1. The directors have not yet made any announcement as to any permanent policy in regard to a regular periodical dividend. During the month of September, the regular monthly report issued by the mine manager, Mr. R. C. Coffey shows that the shaft enlargement has been completed to a depth of 340 feet. The mill ran 90.5 per cent. of possible time during the same period. The mill handled 1,716 tons, with a recovery of \$30,865.42, the average grade being close to \$18 per ton, which is very high-grade ore though not as much so as ore run through the Lake Shore mill in many months in the past, the regular average being around \$20.00 to \$25.00 per ton for the Lake Shore.

The next regular meeting of the Timmins Lodge of the Rebekahs will be held on Thursday evening of next week, Nov. 23rd in the L.O.O.F. Hall. This is a specially important meeting as it will include the election of officers for the ensuing term, and all Rebekahs should attend.
