

**FILMING THE COMPLETE STORY OF GOLD PRODUCTION**

**LANDS OF SPECULATORS A DANGER TO NORTH LAND**

At the Fire Marshall's enquiry into the recent central Temiskaming fire, special emphasis was given some days ago to the danger to the settlers from lands held for speculative purposes. Most of these lands were Veteran Grants and had been held for years. On Hilliard Township alone, according to the testimony of C. Wood, municipal clerk, twenty-five per cent. of the land was held as Veterans' lots, uncleared except where roads had been put through or fires had burned. These lots were held apparently for speculative purposes, at prices higher than they were worth. One other witness suggested that the holders of the Veteran claims be compelled to settle on the claims or forfeit them. The general opinion of the witnesses was that these lands held for speculation constituted a direct fire menace and retarded the general safety and settlement. For years there have been complaints about these parcels of land held for speculation. In many districts they cripple settlement. They will be held uncleared among settled land and prove a serious burden on the latter. If the enquiry is followed by any plan that will upset the present situation created by the holding of Veteran claims unsettled some good will be credited to the enquiry by the people of the North Land.

**MATTAGAMI MEETING ENDORSES ANNEXATION.**

For some time past there has been street talk and rumor to the effect that the residents of Mattagami were so annoyed over the delay in the final annexation of Mattagami to Timmins that there was a chance that the townsites might drop the plan of being annexed. As the delay has been due to the "red tape" that so often burdens legal proceedings, the Town of Timmins could do no more than explain the situation and leave the matter to the good judgment of the people of Mattagami. That the people of the Mattagami townsites appreciate the situation and take the proper attitude is proven by the proceedings at a meeting there this week. This meeting of the ratepayers was called for Monday evening and there were 42 ratepayers in attendance. Mr. George Chartier was appointed chairman for the occasion and Mr. R. Croteau secretary of the meeting. Dr. J. A. McInnis, Mayor of Timmins, was present and explained what the town could do for the Mattagami area when annexation was formally completed. Next year it would be possible to give police protection, fire protection and a surface water line service. When the feeling of the meeting was tested out, it was found that the ratepayers present were unanimous in endorsing annexation to the town of Timmins.


