**RICH STRIKE OF GOLD ON  
BLUE QUARTZ GOLD MINES**

Visible Gold a Feature of Samples.  
Assays Show Striking Results.

Some days ago, Mr. J. J. Hollinger, manager of the Blue Quartz Gold Mines, sent telegram to the head office in Toronto reporting another rich ore shoot encountered with extraordinary showings of free gold. This was followed by samples that were especially rich and well shot with free gold.

The Blue Quartz Gold Mines property borders on Painkiller Lake, Beatty Township. There are about 600 acres in the property, and there is a well-equipped mining plant. Mr. J. J. Hollinger is the manager at the mine, and there are about thirty men on the payroll.

The big values recovered so far have been from what is known as the Wonder Vein. In September about seven tons of ore from the 100-ft. level of this Wonder Vein were sorted over and bagged and fourteen bags were shipped to the Temiskaming Testing Laboratories, operated by the Ontario Government, at Cobalt. The report from the Laboratories showed that Sample No. 1 contained 6.2 ozs. silver per ton and 12.21 ozs. gold per ton, with a total value of \$244.30 per ton. Sample No. 2 showed 7 ozs. silver and 12.41 ozs. gold per ton and total value of \$248.20 per ton. The average was 6.6 ozs. silver and 12.31 ozs. gold per ton and value of \$246.25 per ton.

In the recent telegram referred to Mr. J. J. Hollinger said: "Another rich ore shoot encountered 135 feet north east. Free gold showing extraordinary. Vein very strong." Samples followed which were rich specimens and literally impregnated with visible gold. Seven channel samples were taken across the face, and the report from the Temiskaming Testing Laboratories showed values from \$3.20 to \$3366.80 per ton. Two of the samples assayed values of \$110.80 and \$170.20 respectively. The \$3366.80 value per ton showed 39.1 ozs. silver and 168.34 ozs. gold per ton. The average of these seven samples was \$525.00 in value per ton.

These figures indicate that the vein is getting richer, as assays a few days before, did not reach near the values indicated, though they indicated, very rich ore at that.

It is the intention to sink a winze from the 200-ft. level on the Wonder Vein and a larger hoist is on order and will be delivered and installed in a few days.

The Blue Quartz Gold Mines Co. is amply financed for its development programme. Mr. H. C. Crow, of Toronto, the President, returned recently from England where he was successful in raising sufficient capital from British interests to do the necessary development work and instal a mill. The mill will likely be built in the near future. The company is not selling stock, but is devoting all attention to making a mine of the property.

The old-timers have always held a big interest in the Painkiller Lake area and the progress of the Blue Quartz Gold Mines will be watched with the keenest attention.

Cobalt and other outside interests are said to be thinking over the matter, but no official announcement has been made.

**HEAVY FINES FOR BREACH  
OF DOMINION HEALTH LAWS**

Last week Mr. Baker, an officer of the Dominion Health Dept., Ottawa, was a visitor to the district, and as a result of his visit, Mrs. M. Klem, on the charge of feeding garbage to her pigs, was fined \$200.00 and costs. The evidence went to suggest that she had collected garbage for feeding to the pigs, though the law strongly forbids this practice as dangerous to the public health. A Schumacher man was fined \$100.00 and costs for a similar offence, while one man from Iroquois Falls paid \$200.00 and costs and another \$50.00 and costs for the same sort of offence.

Alex. Kudla, for illegally having firearms without the required permit, was fined \$5.00 and costs.

A couple of ordinary drunks paid the usual \$10.00 and costs.

Geo. Groleau, on a charge of attempted rape, was found guilty and sentenced to six months in North Bay jail.

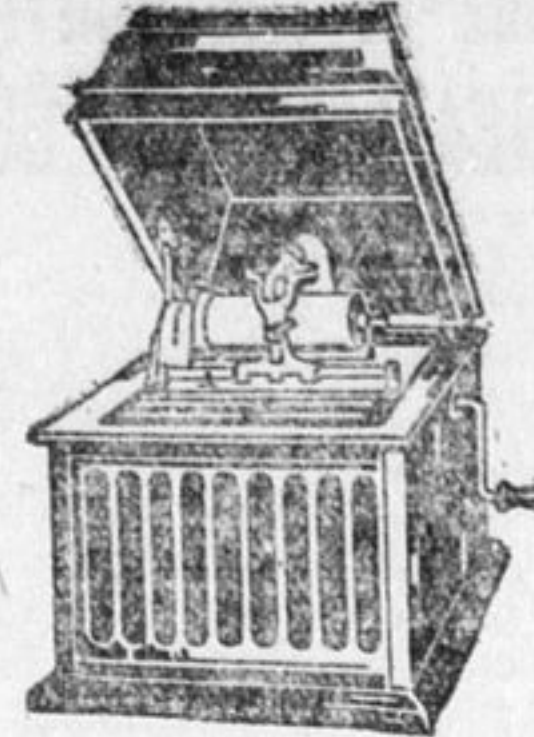
Steve Parachuk on a charge of selling liquor, and Mrs. Steve Parachuk on the charge of illegally having liquor, were each remanded to this week's court.

CO. ASK GOVT. ASSISTANCE**

The Temiskaming Telephone Co. was one of the heavy losers in the recent central Temiskaming fire. Equipment costing over \$60,000.00, and now worth much more to replace, was destroyed by fire. The fire also meant a very large loss of revenue, present and prospective. Now, the company is very anxious to resume the service at its full usefulness, but is handicapped for funds. It is found impossible to borrow further from the banks, so an effort is being made to borrow \$40,000.00 from the Ontario Government, the amount to be secured by mortgage and to be repayable in a term of years. In securing this loan the assistance of the Liskeard Town Council has been solicited and will likely be given. Speaking of the question the New Liskeard Speaker says:—

"As everyone knows, the Temiskaming Telephone Company was very heavily hit by the recent Central Temiskaming Fires. The wiping out of the business section of Haileybury and Charlton, means an enormous loss to the company in equipment, independent of the cutting off of hundreds of subscribers. In the rural sections, the company also suffered heavily. As the Temiskaming Telephone Company is the pioneer telephone company of the Northland, and as it has been one of the big factors in the success of the country, much sympathy is extended to the shareholders and management, in their present position. Mr. T. Mc Camus, President of the Company, waited upon the Town Council at the meeting of Tuesday evening, asking that the Council assist the Company in a proposal to secure a monetary grant from the Ontario Government, to enable them to "carry on" in the satisfactory manner in which they have for some years past."
