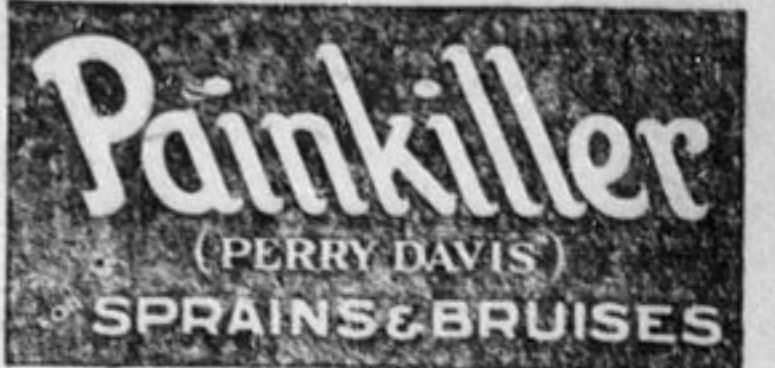
Mr. P. J. Smith was in Toronto last week for medical examination in connection with his overseas service.
