#### NEW JAILER APPOINTED TO NORTH BAY PROV. JAIL

Any from the North Land going down hereafter to North Bay for enforced holidays for insulting Hon. Mr. Raney, or for other reasons, will find a new host at the Provincial Stone-wall Stopping Place. After a delay of over half a year, announcement was made last week by the Attorney-General's Department that Constable Joseph W. Bourke, of the North Bay police force, had received the appointment of jailer at the North Bay Provincial jail, to succeed the late James Bailey who died last May. The new jailer has been connected with police work since he was 19 years of age. He was first connected with a private detective agency. From 1899 to 1904 he served with the R.N.W.P., earning his corporal's stripes by specially effective secret service work. On his return to the North Land he was employed as a detective on the T. & N. O. Railway during its construction days. He has also had other important police duties to perform and has proven himself a capable and trustworthy officer on all occasions. Since the beginning of this year he has been on the North Bay force as a plainclothesman.

#### FAMILY HAD TO CLING TO ICE CAKES FOR THREE HOURS

A most unusual experience is reported from Sault Ste. Marie. According to the despatches from that town, Mr. and Mrs. Guy McIntyre and their few-months-old baby are recuperating after a terrible experience and a very narrow escape from death. On Wednesday night last they were compelled to leave their yacht, Mopica, after it had been crushed by ice in St. Mary's River. Mrs. McIntyre is being treated in a hospital, her legs having been badly frozen. Mr. McIntyre and the baby, while suffering from exposure are not in as serious a condition as Mrs. McIntyre. When the boat sank the parents were compelled to leap into the water and cling to large cakes of ice. McIntyre, grasping the baby, managed to crawl on a solid cake, but Mrs. McIntyre was not so fortunate. The cake on which she sought refuge continually tipped and swayed with the current and wind, and she was kept constantly drenched. For over three hours they floated this way; until their cries for help were heard by the coast guard at Oakridge Park, a mile and a half away, who rescued them.

#### FORMER RESIDENTS OF SCHUMACHER BEREAVED.

Their many friends in this Camp will deeply regret to learn of the recent bereavement of Mr. and Mrs. Roy Turner, formerly of Schumacher, by the death of their 11-year-old daughter, Jennie Catherine, who passed away on Monday, November 21st. An Edmonton newspaper of recent date says:—"The funeral was held at Brule on Tuesday afternoon, at four o'clock, Mr. Roach officiating. The service was largely attended by her friends and little schoolmates who wished to pay their last tributes. Four of her cunts acted as pallbearers. The remains were brought to the city on Wednesday morning's train and the funeral was held Wednesday afternoon at 2.30 o'clock from Howard & McBride's, Rev. Bainbridge officiating. Interment was made in the Edmonton cemetery."

#### DEATH LAST WEEK OF MRS. VAILLANCOURT, NORTH BAY.

Mrs. Marguerite Vaillancourt died on Tuesday, December 5th, at the home of her daughter, Mrs. M. A. Walsh, 62 Percy street North Bay, after an illness of several weeks. Mrs. Vaillancourt suffered from cancer and a few days before her death pneumonia developed which hastened the end. Mrs. Vaillancourt had been a resident of North Bay for a couple of months, coming there from Englehart to reside with her daughter, Mrs. Walsh. The late Mrs. Vaillancourt was born at Mount St. Patrick some 62 years ago. Her husband died some years ago, and three daughters and three sons survive. The daughters are Mrs. Geo. Tucker, of Haileybury; Mrs. M. Landers, of Cobalt; and Mrs. M. A. Walsh, of North Bay. The sons surviving are William, of Chicago; George, of Detroit; and Joseph, of the T. & N.O., Timmins. Four sisters,—Mrs. Belanger, of Espanola; Mrs. Laronde and Mrs. Robillard, of Romford; and Mrs. Prevost, of Sudbury,—and four brothers,—William Dubroy, of Coniston, and Alex. Edward, and Theodore Dubroy, of Sudbury,—also survive. To these and to the other near relatives and friends the sincere sympathy of all will go out in their bereavement. The funeral took place on Tuesday morning to St. Vincent de Paul church, and after funeral mass was said by Rev. Father Chapleau, the remains were taken to Englehart where interment took place in the Roman Catholic cemetery.
