DOMES WILL DOUBLE DIVIDEND IN JULY NEXT

Increase to Take the Form of 100 Per Cent. Stock Distribution.

In a statement to shareholders of the Dome Mines, the President, Mr. J. S. Bache, outlines the plans of the directors with regard to an increase in dividends. Beginning with the dividend to be paid in July next, a regular dividend of \$4 per share per annum on the present capitalization will be inaugurated, and in assurance of continuation of the same, the sum of \$1,000,000 has been set aside to be added to from time to time until the fund amount to at least one whole year's dividends at the above mentioned rate.

The doubling of the present rate will in reality take the form of a stock dividend. In explanation of this the President goes on to say:—"It is believed that prior to the July dividend, the necessary arrangements will have been completed where by the capitalization of the company will consist of shares of no par value, and whereby each holder of the present shares will be entitled to exchange same at the rate of one share of the present stock for four shares of the new stock, and on which new shares said dividend will amount to one dollar per share per annum."

The present cash position of the company shows that in addition to supplies on hand, of \$277,500, the company has on hand cash, \$1,240,000, and bonds at cost of \$1,464,385, or total current assets of \$2,981,885 out of which this above sum \$1,000,000 has been set aside for the purpose as above stated."

At a meeting of the Board of Directors, held last week, a dividend of 50 cents per share was declared payable Jan. 20th., 1923, to shareholders of record on Dec. 30th., 1922.

The I.O.D.E. is arranging to give a Christmas Tree in the I.O.O.F. Hall on Saturday evening, Dec. 23rd, for children of fire sufferers here and for any other children in the district who might otherwise be without a regular Christmas this year.

MUNICIPAL NOMINATIONS ON FRIDAY, DECEMBER 22

Owing to the usual date for municipal nominations falling on Christmas Day this year, the law provided for the nominations to be held on Friday, Dec. 22nd. On Monday, Jan. 1st, the elections will be held. In addition to the possibility of voting for candidates for mayor and councillors, the ratepayers at the election on the first will vote on the by-law re the Hollinger new water main passing through town.

HUNDRED SQUARE MILES NOW STAKED IN QUEBEC

There is quite a rush into the new goldfields of Northwestern Quebec. About a hundred prospectors are said to be working in this new field now, and an area of practically one hundred square miles has been staked up. The Township of Rouyn is reported as staked solid, Boisehatel and Dasse-reat Townships are also well staked and other nearby townships have their quota of claims staked. A number of good finds are reported, especially in the district around Pelletier Lake. The field promises to be a very important one.

There was a very large vote polled, fully 75 per cent. of the voters turning out to vote.

GROWING UP CLOSE TO TWO MILLIONS A MONTH

The production of gold from the mines of Northern Ontario exceeded \$1,900,000 for the month of November according to preliminary estimates. This constitutes the highest rate of output on record in this country. Development work during the month was exceedingly favourable, and tends to point to a steady rise in production for years to come. An outstanding feature in this connection is that not only are the leading mines laying construction plans for greatly increasing their output, but there are also a large number of new mines looming up that offer good promise of comparing favourably with the present established producers. It has become evident that the Porcupine and the Kirkland Lake producing areas will broaden out as well as grow in length and it has become equally apparent that other big gold mining centres will become established at intervals over the length and breadth of an area that is hundreds of miles in length from east to west and with its northern boundary as yet undefined.

Cochrane has added itself to the list of towns having an early closing by-law for business places. Cochrane's new by-law goes into effect in the beginning of the new year.

NOTICE

A synopsis of proposed By-law to authorize an agreement between the Municipal Corporation of the Town of Timmins and the Hollinger Consolidated Gold Mines Limited whereby it is provided that the Mine install a water pumping station on land near Mattagami River and a Twenty inch water main through the Town of Timmins; the Mine to supply the Town with all water required by the Municipality at cost, the lifetime of the work to be deemed 20 years, normal pressure to be 50 lbs. and Fire pressure 100 lbs; the Town to have first call on water for fire purposes.

The Town to convey to the Mine land necessary for Pump station and to lease the present pump station and land occupied therewith to the Mine; same to be maintained by the Mine; to chlorinate water passing through the existing ten inch main; and to permit the Mine to use without charge the present water main; to take all water required for town use from the Mine; to permit the Mine to use and occupy the highways of the Municipality for the purpose of such installation.

The agreement to enure for a term of ten years and for two further and successive terms of ten years each, or as long as permitted by the Municipal Act, and at the termination thereof the Town to have the right to purchase the plant and undertaking. Valuation to be fixed by arbitration.

The above is a true synopsis of a proposed by-law and if the assent of the electors is obtained to it it will be taken into consideration by the Council of the Municipal Corporation of Timmins after one month from the sixth day of December, 1922, being the date of first publication thereof, and the polls for taking the votes of the electors will be held at the Town Hall and Finlanders Hall in the Town of Timmins at the annual election on Monday the first day of January 1923, between the hours of Nine o'clock in the forenoon and Five o'clock in the afternoon.

On the 29th day of December, 1922, at the hour of Ten o'clock in the forenoon the Head of the Council of the said Corporation, or some member of the Council appointed for that purpose by resolution, shall attend at the Town Offices in the Town of Timmins for the purpose of appointing, and if requested so to do shall appoint by writing signed by him, two persons to attend at the final summing up of the votes by the Clerk, and one person to attend at the polling place on behalf of the persons interested in and promoting the proposed by-law and one person on behalf of the persons interested in and opposing the proposed by-law.

On the Second day of January 1923, being the day following the return of the ballot papers, at the hour of Twelve o'clock noon at the Town Offices in the Town of Timmins the Clerk of the Municipality shall attend and sum up the votes given for and against the proposed By-law.

The said By-law will be taken into consideration by the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Timmins in meeting at the Town Hall on Monday the 8th day of January, 1923. Dated, December 5th, 1922.

The following information is summarized from a letter of J. R. Dodworth, Chairman of the Board of Directors, and from a report of Mr. A. R. Globe, the Company's Engineer.

PROPERTIES—The Company owns and controls under Crown Lease and under working option and under optional agreements of purchase, 1,234 acres in Townships of Cody and Macklem, being approximately in one block in an easterly-westerly direction in length about three miles on a peninsula of Night Hawk Lake in the Porcupine district, being about ten miles south by water from Connaught Station on the T. & N. O. Railway and about six miles by winter road from Hoyle Station.

OPERATING FACILITIES—Transportation presents no difficulty whatever. Labour is efficient and abundant. Hydro Electric Power is available. The present Steam Plant being operated by wood cut in the vicinity, will be replaced in the Spring by Electric Power. The new Plant installed November 1st has a capacity of 15 Drills, replacing the 3-Drill Compressor, and with the new hoist will carry development to the 1,000-ft. level. Mill foundations are completed ready for erection of Mill in the Spring.

DEVELOPMENT AND ORE RESERVES—Exploration by shafts, pits, diamond drilling, trenching and outcrops has demonstrated a continuous ore fissure for a distance of 10,000 ft., the ore bodies and conditions at both ends and the middle being similar. Intensive development to date has been restricted to the western end of the fissure, where over \$1,600,000 of ore of an average grade, top, bottom and sides, of \$12.00 per

ton has been definitely blocked out, in an area of less than a quarter of an acre, or 3% of the length of the main fissure and to a depth of 300 ft. The history of Porcupine today shows that ore has been developed to a depth of 2,000 ft. in a similar formation. It will therefore readily be seen that along this vein of 10,000 ft. to a depth of 2,000 ft., only one part in 231 has been developed. With eight faces of ore, development is placing in sight in excess of \$500,000 additional ore reserves per month, or at the rate of \$6,000,000 per year, and, as new levels are opened up, this rate of increase will be accelerated.

MANAGEMENT—The management of the Night Hawk Peninsular Mines, Limited, is in the hands of Mr. A. R. Globe, who was for several years Assistant General Manager of Hollinger Consolidated Mines, Limited, and who has surrounded himself with a staff of young engineers trained and experienced for the past ten years mostly in the Northern Ontario Mines.
