### SUDBURY'S PLAN FOR FIRE RELIEF, PROVINCIAL LEVY

When the Town Council at Sudbury received the communication from the Fire Relief Committee asking for a contribution either by voluntary subscription or raised by a special assessment on all in the municipality, the Sudbury Council "passed the buck to Drury," as The Star phrases it. The Sudbury Council passed a resolution to be forwarded to the Drury Government suggesting that a better way to raise any amount necessary would be by a Provincial tax on all municipalities, similar to the special Provincial tax in force during the war. And that's that.

### SUDBURY "WOLVES" HAVE THEIR FIRST PRACTICE

The following from the last issue of The Sudbury Star will be of interest to all hockey fans, and particularly to the many here from Sudbury and district:—

"The Wolves didn't exactly 'gladden the hearts of the fans' at the inaugural practice at Palace Rink last night, for they practiced without the assistance of the rail birds. The executive is following a new tack this year, gaining by their experience of former seasons and are holding the first week's practices behind closed doors. Next Monday night all fans will be welcome to see their beloved Wolves in action once more, but players and executive would prefer to have the week to themselves until they get acquainted and at least find their hockey legs. The gossip of the rail birds of previous years didn't exactly tend to make some players love each other. Last night only the executive and newspaper representatives were present. Coach 'Shorty' Green wasted no time getting down to business and the boys were soon in action all fit and eager. Eleven of the fourteen players signed were in uniform and on the ice. It was the most business-like inaugural the Wolves have had for several seasons. The players liked the innovation. They had a real 60-minute session. Langlois who had trouble getting into form all last season, stepped onto ice in mid-season shape and went the whole distance. Ironstone, Bill Duncan and Ray Smith were the only absentees. Freddie Faught filled one of the nets while Coach Green directed play from the other citadel. Practices will be held every night this week."

### COMMITTEE MAKES CHANGES IN FIRE RELIEF SYSTEM

Changes have been made in the distribution system of the Northern Ontario Fire Relief Committee, it is learned. By the new plans it is expected to lessen the cost of getting clothing and other materials to the fire sufferers. At present there are eight or nine relief distributing stations in the North. The new plan is to distribute all relief from a special car on trains which will call once a week at Northern points at the same time each week. Families will thus know exactly when the train with the relief car will arrive and will be able to receive required aid at less cost for distribution.

Haileybury or New Liskeard likely will be the headquarters for relief distribution, and the special car will load at these points and travel with whatever train is available so as to keep to its schedule. Arrangements have been completed with the officials of the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Railway for this new method of distribution and a schedule has been pretty definitely settled on. The special car will start, it is expected on its rounds next week.

Money still is needed and to take care of the fire sufferers throughout the winter, and, in some cases, until after the harvest, will take considerable funds.

Arrangements have been made to open a 10-bed hospital in Haileybury. This will relieve congestion existing in other emergency hospitals. The Daughters of the Empire have granted \$6,000 for equipping the building, which will be operated by the Red Cross and the Northern Ontario Relief Committee.

W. H. Alderson, Chairman of the Committee, has made arrangements to give his whole time and attention to the relief work for the next 12 months.
