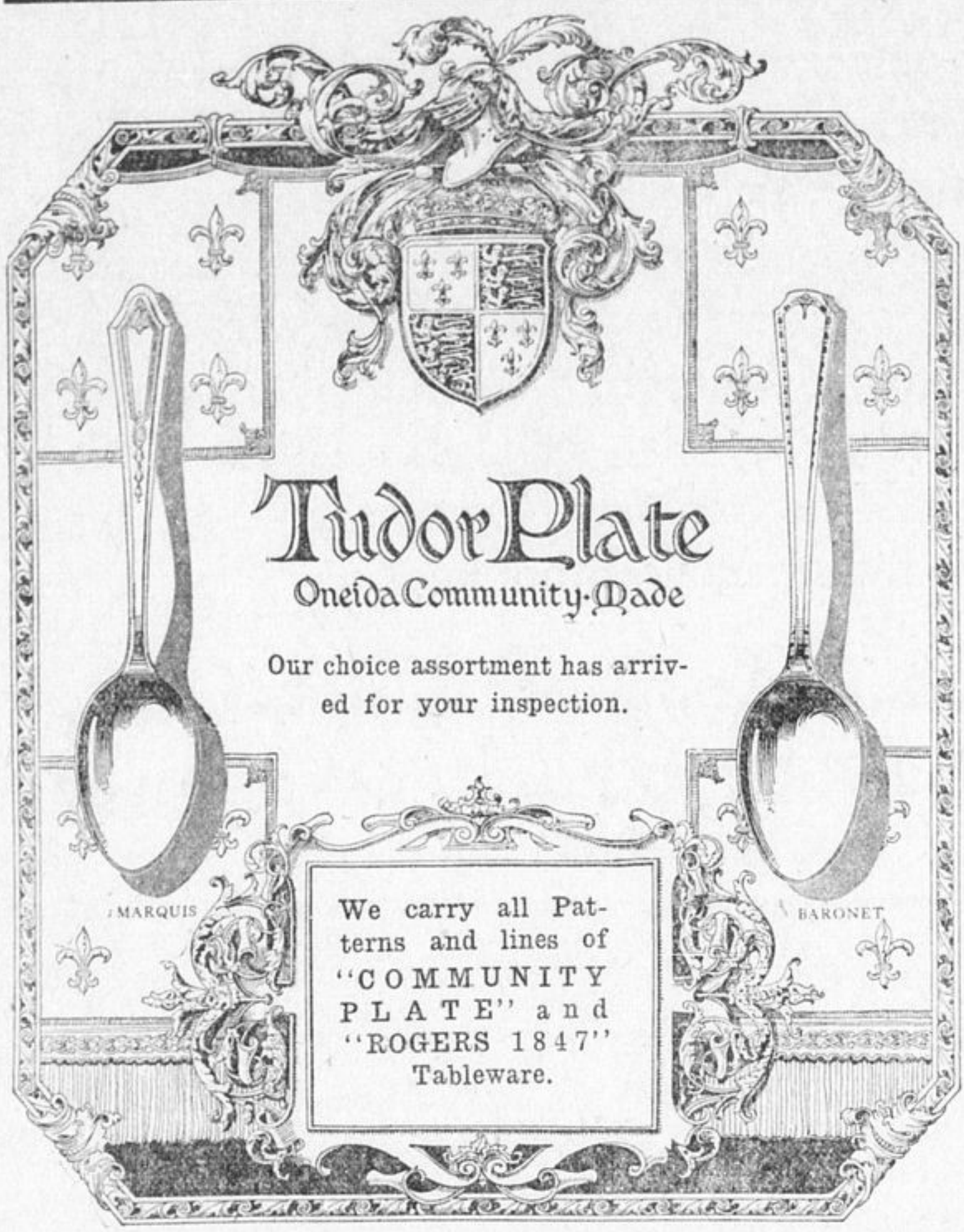


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## MORE LATITUDE FOR O.H.A. GOALKEEPERS IN GAMES

O.H.A. Annual Meeting Makes Important Amendments to Rules Of Games, Etc.

Goalkeepers were given permission to stop the puck any way they desired, and pro coaches were barred from the penalty box and players' bench during games at the thirty-third annual meeting of the Ontario Hockey Association. Over eighty clubs, several of them new ones, were represented at the meeting, which was one of the most successful ever held in the history of the world's greatest amateur hockey body. The large number of amendments up for the consideration of the meeting brought out some earnest discussion, showing that the proposed changes to the rules and regulations had been studied very closely.

The motion to bar professional coaches and trainers from handling teams on the ice; sitting on or near the players' benches during games; or assisting injured players from the ice, developed a good deal of discussion. Mr. Farquharson, of Stratford, was decidedly in favour of abolishing all professional coaches, whether in practices or games. He gave notice of motion of this for the next annual meeting.

The first two clauses of the amendment were carried. The third clause was amended to read that the clubs must name to the referee the person who may be permitted on the ice in case of injury to players.

The sentiment of the meeting was decidedly opposed to professional coaching of any kind. Infractions of the rule will be reported to the executive for action instead of a team losing the services of a player for five minutes of the game in which the offence is committed, as was first proposed.

All past presidents resident in Ontario will form an Advisory Board of the Association to meet twice a year at the executive meetings, one of which will be the one immediately before the annual convention. The immediate Past President will be chairman of this board.

Four executive members will be elected at the annual meeting, and the president will appoint two, one of whom must be a member of the Northern O.H.A., unless that association is already represented on the executive by election.

The motion to make executive members ineligible as players was given short shrift, as it should.

The amendment to allow junior players to play as many senior or intermediate games as they wish was not carried. The feeling of the meeting that it was not the object of the O.H.A. to win championships, but to develop hockey players.

The goalkeeper's territory was defined as follows: A dark, distinguishing line shall be drawn on the ice between the centre of each goalpost and extending one foot on each side. From the centre of this line and fronting the goal a half-circle shall be drawn in the ice with a radius of four feet. This area shall be the goaltender's territory.

Useless kicking will be stopped by the adoption of the following rule, which was passed:—The puck may be stopped with the hand but not carried or held or knocked on by any part of the body. A player must not throw the puck or shove it along the ice with his hand or kick it deliberately. (Penalty at least one minute for each offence).

It was recommended that all the officials, referee, assistant referee, goal umpires and timekeepers, in the finals or semi-finals be neutral, and appointed by the executive of the O.H.A.

The honorarium of the secretary for the season of 1921-1922 was moved at \$1,200, and the treasurer at \$200.

The meeting decided that referees should in all cases report with reference to the lighting of each rink at each game, stating if in his opinion the rink is sufficiently lighted to allow spectators to follow the game at all times in a satisfactory manner. Detrimental reports will be immediately dealt with by the executive.

The report of Sheriff J. F. Paxton, treasurer of the O.H.A. showed a cash balance in the bank of \$7,478.87, in addition to \$5,000 Victory bonds. Last year the balance was \$4,399.64.

The officers were elected as follows: Past President, A. E. Copeland, of Midland; president, W. A. Fry, Dunnville; first vice-president, Wm. Eason, Stratford; second vice-president, Geo. B. McKay, Kitchener; A.A.U. of C. governor, W. Davidson, Toronto; treasurer, Sheriff J. F. Paxton, Whitby; secretary, W. A. Hewitt, Toronto; executive committee, J. Percy Bond, Peterboro; R. Butler, Lindsay; Angus D. Campbell, Cobalt, and R. Wylie, Wilkinson, Galt.
