Timmins and District Notes

The annual Christmas Tree and Social Time for the children of the Presbyterian church is being held this (Wednesday) evening, and will undoubtedly be a pleasant and happy event for the children as in past years.

The Town Council of Brockville, Ont., last week went on record as favouring a Provincial levy, similar to the War Tax, for raising money for Northern Ontario Fire Relief. Several other municipalities, including Sudbury, have made the same suggestion.

A large pack of wolves is said to be roaming the bush in the Latchford district. Two Latchford men have told of encountering the wolves one day recently. The men were unarmed, but the wolves slunk away from the carcass of a deer they had killed and were devouring.

Haileybury's fire engine, which saw active service on October 4th, for the first time in several years, and had to be abandoned on Ferguson Ave. where it was badly damaged during the height of the conflagration, is to be repaired and put into commission again.

A reader of The Advance suggests that this paper advocate the establishment of a public library in Timmins. The Advance did that some many months ago. A by-law was duly passed in connection with the establishment of a public library and other necessary steps taken, but then the matter seemed to drop from notice. It would be a good thing if interest were revived in the matter of a public library for Timmins.

AVERAGE GRADES OF ORE OF THE BIG GOLD MINES

The figures recently prepared by the Ontario Department of Mines show that the average recovery per ton in gold from Ontario Mines during the first nine months of this year is \$9.31. Lake Shore at Kirkland Lake shows the largest average grade per ton, but just to keep Kirkland Lake from being unduly proud of this the lowest average grade also comes from that camp, as does also the second lowest. The following are the average recoveries for the nine months for the producers of Porcupine and Kirkland Lake:—Lake Shore, \$20.54; Teck-Hughes, \$13.41; Wright-Hargreaves, \$11.49; Dome, \$11.03; McIntyre, \$10.04; Hollinger \$8.83; Kirkland Lake Gold, \$6.47; Kirkland Lake Proprietary, \$6.29. The average for Ontario was \$9.31; for Kirkland Lake, \$11.86; for Porcupine \$9.07. The total of the gold production of Porcupine was \$13,789,989 and of Kirkland Lake, \$1,713,190.
