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**NEW "NORTH LAND" PARTY
 LIKELY FORMED IN U.F.O.**

Members of U.F.O. from North Province New Association With Motto, "Northern Ontario Before Party."

This week there is a convention of the U.F.O. (the United Farmers of Ontario) in Toronto. Between one and two hundred of the delegates at this Convention are men from Northern Ontario, and according to despatches last week the Northern men, or at least a large portion of them are planning a meeting of their own during their visit to Toronto. They propose to draw up a list of the grievances of the North Land, and it will naturally be a long list, though it may all be summed up in the words that Northern Ontario has been used too much as a milch cow and a place to throw the bull, which seems to be suitable farm phraseology. The U.F.O. delegates from the North, however, are not going to stop at drawing up a list of grievances. Their plan is to go on and have the grievances removed. To this end, they are thinking of starting a new association with the aim well described by the motto, "Northern Ontario before party." In the coming election the idea will be to have a candidate in every riding in the North Land who will be specially pledged to put the interests of the North Land first, foremost and paramount. The new association does not propose to oppose any candidate pledged to support its platform of a square deal for the North, no matter what party he may profess allegiance to. The argument of these Northern men is that if all the members from the North had a common objective and worked together, something would be done at the legislature to improve conditions in New Ontario and remove certain abuses. Also, the truth about the North and its great possibilities would be more widely known.

It is interesting in the meantime to speculate as to whether or not Premier Drury or Mr. J. J. Morrison, singly, or together, may succeed in smoothing out this incipient rebellion among the farmers of the North. It is not beyond imagination to figure on Drury and Morrison actually getting

together to fight a common foe like this. The heads of the U.F.O. may be able to twist the malecontents round their fingers, and the plan for forming a new association may fall through as similar moves have done in the past. Premier Drury would object as strongly as Mr. Morrison to this sort of broadening out. The Premier may be able to convince these restless Northern U.F.O. fellows that they should be content with the situation in which Heaven has placed them, and so accept the principle that the only excuse for the existence of Northern Ontario is to provide resources for the building of roads and other works of art in the southern portions of the Province. On the other hand the North Land men may refuse to be cajoled. In such a case, a new association with the sole purpose of seeing that the North Land is given a square deal may be formed and may accomplish much of benefit to the new North. Whatever the outcome, a merry Christmas to everybody.

**MUST SECURE SAMPLES OF
 LIQUOR FOR CONVICTIONS**

To secure convictions for breach of the O.T.A. it is necessary to have samples of the liquor for the sale or illegal possession of which the convictions are sought. When law officers are unable to get this "evidence," then their case can not be upheld. This was the substance of a judgement last week of his Honour Judge Leask of North Bay, when he quickly quashed the conviction by Magistrate Weegar against Dominic Swrace of Welland. Swrace was convicted on Nov. 13th, and fined \$500 and costs for selling liquor. In addition, despite the fact that both he and his counsel protested vigorously, he was sentenced to three months in jail for refusing to disclose where he secured the liquor which he was convicted of selling. When Swrace was tried, the police had no solid (liquid) evidence to show the kind of liquor concerned in the case. The North Bay police now will likely carry syphons, stomach pumps and other paraphernalia so that "evidence" may be secured when necessary. When this was suggested to one local legal light he replied quite seriously that such evidence would not be admissible, but that the police in such cases must secure some other sort of inside information.

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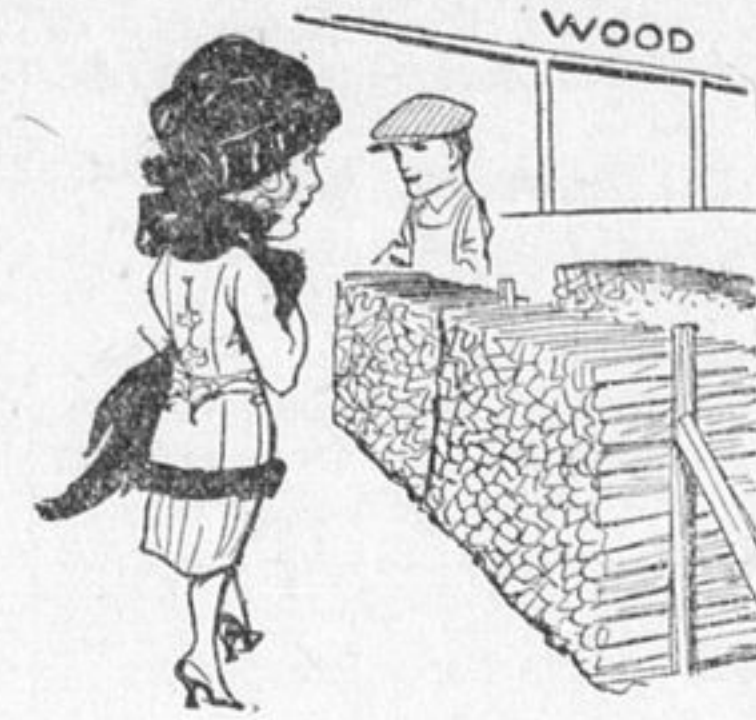
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
