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REGULAR ANNUAL MEET OF N.O.H.A. EXECUTIVE

Much Important Business. New Rule for Goal Tenders. Coaches May Continue with Seniors, Etc.

At the recent regular annual meeting of the N.O.H.A. executive called to consider schedules, playing certificates, transfers, etc., and generally put the affairs of the league in shape to commence the active season, was a full attendance, with President Brodie presiding. Other members were A. D. Campbell from Cobalt, F. E. Thompson, New Liskeard, Geo. W. Turk, Iroquois Falls, and Secretary H. P. Charlton.

The new rule respecting goal keepers recently passed by the C.A.H.A. and O.H.A., allowing a goal keeper to stop the puck in any position or manner he wishes, but shall not throw or hold it, was adopted by the N.O.H.A. The same crease marking will also apply.

Professional coaches will be allowed to continue in charge of senior N.O.H.A. teams, but have been barred from the intermediate and junior series. The resolution adopted by the executive Saturday night reads: "That no professional be allowed to sit in or near the penalty box or to direct or interfere with the play or players in any manner during the match. This ruling to apply to intermediate and junior series only, and that it also apply in any N.O.H.A. game in a play off, etc., with any other association."

Transfers were granted to John Brackenborough, from North Bay to Hamilton; F. McCurry, from Timmins to Toronto; R. Worters, from Timmins to Toronto; J. M. Levine, from Timmins to Milwaukee.

A transfer was refused Wilfrid H. Allerier from Iroquois Falls to Duun, Minn. This player is under suspension of the N.O.H.A. Sault Hockey Club has been advised that this player is in Duluth and to be governed accordingly.

Playing certificates were withheld in the cases of the following:

Iroquois Falls: L. Larose, A. P. Fahy, G. C. Lowery, R. Connors, R. D. Graham, C. R. W. Day, Gordon Dewar, A. E. Peacock. Held up pending transfers.

The executive is inquiring into Gordon Dewar's residence qualifications.

Sudbury: W. E. Cecil, held up pending transfer; Eric Kauhanen, not satisfied with present birth certificate and asking for further proof.

Thomas Hyland, present birth credentials not satisfactory.

New Liskeard: The residence of Gordon Spence and B. J. R. Montgomery were defined as New Liskeard. Playing certificates of players Leaver, Gagnon, Jones and Stewart were held up pending receipt of birth certificates.

Espanola: Players Brosseau and Larocche, formerly of Rockland, Que., held up pending proper transfers. Little Current is to be asked if any definite objection to transfer of Player Bernard from Little Current to Espanola and meanwhile certificate is held up.

Timmins: Certificates of the following junior players held up pending definite transfers; L. O. Campbell, P. Haspet, J. R. B. Gorman, Albini Chamillard, C. Gordon Ross.

Sault-Ste. Marie: The certificate of A. Renaud is held up pending a ruling of the C.A.H.A., whether or not he is eligible under their ruling that a Canadian player who plays in U.S. and then returns to Canada must be a resident of Canada one year before he is again permitted to play. Renaud formerly played with Edmonton and then went to Calumet. He is a goalkeeper. T. M. Gillespie, transfer from Perth hockey club not sufficient. Must have transfer from Ottawa Valley Association.

Chapleau: Player Schinvin, certificate held up pending transfer from O.H.A. He comes from Parry Sound.

North Bay: A. B. Ralph, held up pending transfer Elmer Maracle, executive not satisfied with bona fide of his residence and additional information is required. Junior Player Brown must satisfy executive that he is a bona fide resident. The different players listed as students with North Bay club must supply N.O.H.A. with letters from their principals that they are students in regular attendance.

Cochrane: E. F. Mulligan, information as to residence required.

It was decided that in all organized juvenile organizations the players of the winning team of each group shall receive from the N.O.H.A. a distinctive badge commemorative of their victory, the secretary of these various organizations to submit to the secretary of the N.O.H.A., names of their officers, copies of their schedules and at the end of their season a proper certificate embracing the names of nine members of that team. N.O.H.A. rules to govern all games.

The application of the Midget Athletic Association of Sudbury was not considered. Similar action was taken in the case of the Sturgeon Falls hockey club, an open air rink proving the barrier.

A sub-committee composed of the president, vice-president and secretary was named to carry on the affairs of the executive.

T. & N. O. SHOULD ATTEND TO STATION AT DOME SIDING

The number and earnestness of the complaints made in the matter would indicate that conditions at the Dome Siding station of the T. & N. O. are most objectionable and that a marked change should be made at once. There is considerable traffic at this station, the building not only serving the Dome but other promising mines like the Clifton and the Paymaster. The business originating at this station would warrant some attention from the railway. The little building ("shack" would not be too poor a name) gives practically no accommodation or protection to the public. The windows are out; there is no bench; there is a cracked old stove, and no firewood, and not even an axe to make firewood with. In view of the uncertainty of trains some sort of proper accommodation is necessary. Mining men, prospectors, etc., coming from the district around the Dome, Clifton and Paymaster must find the lack of accommodation a decided hardship, yet they are not complaining so much for themselves as for the women and children who suffer from the lack of accommodation. The T. & N. O. should see at once that the little shelter is put in decent condition, with some sort of seating accommodation and facilities for heating the building when required. The cost would be trifling compared to the comfort given to the comparatively large patronage at Dome Siding. Thanks! Happy new year!
