O.H.A. INSTRUCTIONS FOR GUIDANCE OF REFEREES, ETC.

The O.H.A. this season, as in the past, is issuing instructions for its referees, and as a guide to the officials in charge of the O.H.A. games suggests penalties as follows:

- One-Minute Penalty**
Goalkeeper or any other player throwing the puck.
Any player kicking the puck deliberately or showing it along the ice with his hand or arm.
Any player holding the puck with his hand, body or foot against the boards or any place on the ice.
Goalkeeper slashing at opponent with stick, or tripping opponent.
Off-side interference, first offence.
Hooking with stick, first offence.
- Two-Minute Penalty**
Accidental trip.
Player throwing own stick, Player throwing opponent's stick.
Off-side interference second offence.
Charging an opponent.
Carrying stick above shoulder.
Arguing with referee.
Hooking with stick, second offence.
Violation of substitution rule.
Any defending player but the goalkeeper lying down sitting down, kneeling or sliding along the ice in the goalkeeper's crease.
- Three-Minute Penalty**
Cross-Checking an opponent.
Deliberate tripping to prevent a goal being scored.
Any player charging a goalkeeper.
Use of foul language.
Kicking opponent with skate.
Hitting opponent on head or face with stick.
- Ten-Minute Penalty**
Deliberate maiming of opponent.
Assault of officials.
Jabbing opponent with butt-end of stick.
- Special Penalties**
Teams not ready to play promptly after the 10-minute intermission to lose player's services on the ice for every minute's delay.
These penalties are at the discretion of the referee, who may use his own judgment as to increasing or decreasing same, according to circumstances.

NO IMPORTANT CASES AT LAST WEEK'S POLICE COURT
