FALLS WON FRIDAY'S GAME BY NARROW MARGIN, 7 to 6

Fast, Clean Hockey, with Teams Dividing the Honours. Referee Helped Make Game Good.

Iroquois Falls won its home game last Friday by the narrow margin of 7 to 6 after a fast clean interesting game that seemed to be Timmins' until the last period, and then looked anybody's game. Timmins lost the game when a couple of men were off for minor offenses, the Falls never yet having failed to take full advantage of such a situation. This was another game that was an honour to win and no disgrace to lose, both teams putting up fast clean hockey that was easy for hockey fans to watch. A couple of hundred went down from Timmins on the special train and all enjoyed the lively exhibition of good hockey. The referee, Mr. W. J. McDonald, New Liskeard, helped make the game good. He checked up the off-sides, the trips, the rough stuff right on the very start and made both teams play hockey, and they did right. It was one of the best handled games seen in this group. The honours were evenly divided, though Timmins seemed to have a shade the better of the play. Penalties were fairly frequent but all for minor offences, close tab being kept on the off-sides and the accident trips. A feature of the game was the number of fine combination plays. Both goal tenders had lots of work and did their part with outstanding skill. McGuire and Fournier starred for Timmins, with Cameron and Campbell doing very effective work particularly in close checking and breaking up Falls combinations. Dr. Behan's stick-handling was a feature of the match and started the crowd cheering more than once. Roche played a good game on defence. Dixie Cox was given a rousing welcome on his first appearance in a game this year and showed some of his speed though not playing long enough to get going in his old-time fashion. For the Falls the combination work of Brydge, Fluker and Quesnell was noteworthy. Quesnell was one of the particular stars of the game. Lafrance also showed speed and form that are very promising. Boucher played a nice defence game with several flashes that showed where he got his reputation. Fahey had to retire from the game after a short time on the ice, his recent illness putting him out of condition. Chirooski did effective work, and like the rest of the Falls team has to be watched.

Timmins started the first period in lively fashion but combination by Fluker and Quesnell resulted in the latter getting the first score. Frank McGuire in a beautiful trip alone soon evened the score, fooling Corbould with a sudden shot in Frank's own inimitable style. Brydge made a nice run down and passed to Shorty in front of the nets, and Quesnell scored again. McGuire and Fournier in good combination work got down and Frank scored on a pass from Fournier. Fournier on a speedy and clever rush scored on his lonesome. In this period both Scully and Corbould were well tested out and stood up well to the test. Timmins 3, Falls 2.

Fournier started the second period by a rush that nearly repeated his successful score in the first period. Corbould made a fine save. Scully was doing good work under an attack when Boucher slammed one in from a rebound from a shot from Quesnell. This period saw one of the prettiest combinations of the evening, Behan McGuire and Campbell going right through in fine fashion. Three times

Corbould saved but eventually Behan batted it in. Combination by Fournier and McGuire resulted in one more for Timmins. Lafrance, after a pretty run through, fooled Scully, and the period saw no more scoring. Timmins 5, Falls 4.

The third period was naturally a humdinger, with high speed and heavy checking in evidence, yet the play clean and fast. Three-man combination work was used by the Falls, Shorty scoring on one of these plays and thus tying the score. Brydge, Fluker and Quesnell again got down and Shorty broke the tie. This being repeated in about a minute, put the Falls two up. McGuire was off on a minor penalty when these things happened, but coming back on the ice he and Behan did nice combination and got through McGuire scoring. Though Timmins played strenuously putting full strength forward, the game closed before a score could be made to tie.

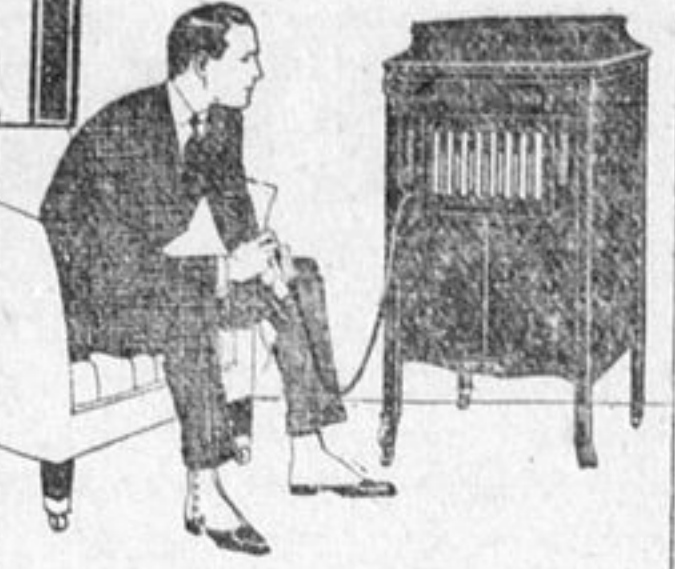
