

TWO MURDER TRIALS AT NEW LISKEARD IN MARCH

Cochrane and Iroquois Falls Cases to be Tried in Farmertown.

For some time past there has been agitation in progress, especially at North Bay, to secure a trial of Arthur Wilde, of Cochrane, held on the charge of murdering his wife on July 12th last. It has been claimed that Wilde desires a disposal of the case as the suspense is proving a burden to him. He attacked his wife after finding her in what he thought to be a compromising situation. She died from the injuries sustained. Wilde gave himself up to the authorities immediately after the tragedy. The other man in the case, a prospector named Wells, is held as a material witness. The case was to have been tried at the Fall Assizes last year, but owing to the destruction of the Court House in the Haileybury fire the hearing was postponed. Now it is understood that the case will come up at the Spring Assizes to be held at New Liskeard in March. Mr. Justice Smith will preside. Another murder case scheduled for the same Assizes is the trial of a Russian or similar foreigner in connection with the death of a man at Iroquois Falls some months ago. This latter case is alleged to have resulted from a drunken brawl. A number of foreigners working at the Falls had a disagreement followed by a strenuous battle of sorts. As a result of the trouble one man met his death and Carl Kelenick, or similar cognomen, was lodged in jail to await trial on the charge of murder.

N.O.H.A. REFUSES TO LIFT SUSPENSION OF ALLARIE

Wilfrid Allarie is now definitely out of hockey for this season, so far as amateur rulings are concerned. Recently Allarie made a special trip to North Bay and Sudbury to see if he could not induce the N.O.H.A. to lift the suspension placed on him last year and allow his transfer to the Duluth Hockey Club this season. The N.O.H.A. executive, however, have decided to hold Allarie under suspension this season, though ready to consider his case again next year. Allarie played last year for the Iroquois Falls Juniors and was accused of using his brother's birth certificate in place of his own. A formal protest from Haileybury resulted in the suspension of Allarie by the N.O.H.A. On his recent visit to Sudbury Allarie is credited with blaming the wrongful use of the certificate upon prominent Iroquois people, but this story coming at this late date could naturally receive little attention. At the time of his suspension Allarie's story was a different one. In connection with the Allarie case the N.O.H.A. last week issued the following statement: "The United States Amateur Hockey Association has been pressing for the transfer of Wilfrid Allarie from the Iroquois Falls club of the N.O.H.A. to the Duluth club, and the N.O.H.A. has replied definitely to Sheriff Haddock, the President of the U.S.A.H.A., that the N.O.H.A. was not prepared to lift Allarie's suspension for the season of 1922-23, but at the completion of the season an application from Allarie for re-instatement would be considered."

The Sudbury Radio Club expects to cover all the Senior Sudbury matches by radio this winter. Running stories of the matches held so far have been broadcasted and additions and improvements have been made in the transmitting apparatus so that still better results are expected.
