Timmins and District Notes

Next on the programme will be the Dog Race and Winter Carnival, eh?

Mr. and Mrs. Wilfred Goode, of Hamilton, were visitors to the Camp last week.

Division Court was held in Timmins on Tuesday of this week, there being over 180 cases, chiefly actions in connection with the condition of taxes in the town and the township.

Mr. Hogan, representative of the London Life Insurance Co., came to town last week, the company intending to open a permanent office in Timmins for the town and district.

It is understood that the Mining Corporation will have considerable diamond drilling done on its claims in the Lightning River district in the near future. Previous work on the properties has given good results.

The police discovered a 46-gallon barrel of alcohol among the apples and Poloni was taken to Grimsby and fined \$200 and costs for an alleged infraction of the O.T.A. Poloni strenuously denies all knowledge of the alcohol and has entered an appeal against the conviction. All this according to newspaper reports now current.

Mr. R. Sims, a popular and esteemed citizen of the Camp for several years in the earlier days of the Porcupine, was a visitor to Timmins over the week-end and was warmly greeted by his hosts of old friends. For some three years past Mr. Sims and family have been living in New Britain, Conn., U.S.A. 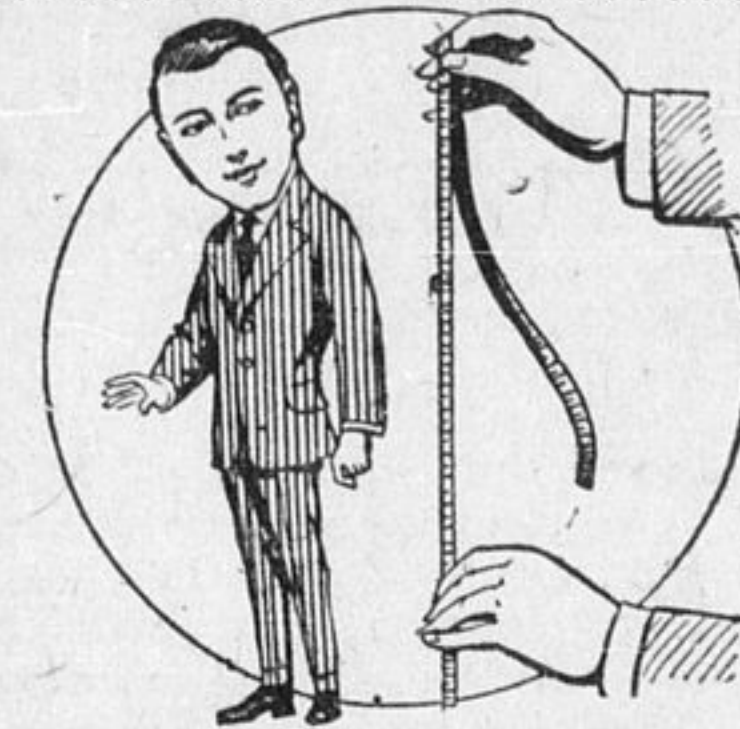
